| 12 | A. The department shall: | |
| 13 | (1) issue a state identification number for | |
| 14 | each public school student for use in the accountability data | |
| 15 | system; | |
| 16 | (2) adopt the format for reporting | |
| 17 | individual student assessments to parents. The student | |
| 18 | assessments shall report each student's progress and academic | |
| 19 | needs as measured against state standards; | |

accountability report shall include the results of that program for each public school. The annual accountability report format shall be clear, concise and understandable to parents and the general public. All annual accountability reports shall ensure that the privacy of individual students is protected;

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(4) require that when public schools, school 7 8 districts, state-chartered charter schools and the state 9 disaggregate and report school data for demographic 10 subgroups, they include data disaggregated by ethnicity, 11 race, limited English proficiency, students with disabilities, poverty and gender; provided that ethnicity and 12 race shall be reported using the following categories: 13 (a) Caucasian, non-Hispanic; 14 15 (b) Hispanic; 16 (c) African American; American Indian or Alaska Native; 17 (d) Native Hawaiian or other Pacific (e) 18 Islander; 19 20 (f) Asian; two or more races; and 21 (g)

other; provided that if the sample 22 of students in any category enumerated in Subparagraphs 23 (a) through (g) of this paragraph is so small that a student 24 25 in the sample may be personally identifiable in violation of HB 453

(h)

the federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the report may combine that sample into the "other" category;

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4 (5) report cohort graduation data annually 5 for the state, for each school district and for each state-6 chartered charter school and each public high school, based on information provided by all school districts and state-7 chartered charter schools according to procedures established 8 by the department; provided that the report shall include the 9 10 number and percentage of students in a cohort who: (a) have graduated by August 1 of the 11 fourth year after entering the ninth grade; 12 (b) have graduated in more than four 13 years, but by August 1 of the fifth year after entering ninth 14 15 grade; 16 (c) have received a state certificate by exiting the school system at the end of grade twelve 17 without having satisfied the requirements for a high school 18 diploma as provided in Section 22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978 or 19 20 completed all course requirements but have not passed the graduation assessment or portfolio of standards-based 21 indicators pursuant to Section 22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978; 22 have dropped out or whose status is (d) 23 unknown; 24

(e)

have exited public school and HB 453 Page 3 indicated an intent to pursue a high school equivalency credential; or

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(f) are still enrolled in public school;

5 (6) report annually, based on data provided 6 by school districts and state-chartered charter schools, the number and percentage of public school students in each 7 cohort in the state in grades nine through twelve who have 8 advanced to the next grade or graduated on schedule, who 9 10 remain enrolled but have not advanced to the next grade on schedule, who have dropped out or whose other educational 11 outcomes are known to the department; and 12

13 (7) establish technical criteria and
14 procedures to define which students are included or excluded
15 from a cohort.

B. Local school boards and governing boards of charter schools may establish additional indicators through which to measure the school district's or charter school's performance.

C. The school district's or state-chartered
charter school's annual accountability report shall include a
report of four- and five-year graduation rates for each
public high school in the school district or state-chartered
charter school. All annual accountability reports shall
ensure that the privacy of individual students is protected. HB 453

1 As part of the graduation rate data, the school district or 2 state-chartered charter school shall include data showing the 3 number and percentage of students in the cohort: 4 (1) who have received a state certificate by 5 exiting the school system at the end of grade twelve without 6 having satisfied the requirements for a high school diploma as provided in Section 22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978 or completed all 7 course requirements but have not passed the graduation 8 assessment or portfolio of standards-based indicators 9 10 pursuant to Section 22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978; (2) who have dropped out or whose status is 11 unknown; 12 (3) who have exited public school and 13 indicated an intent to pursue a high school equivalency 14 15 credential; 16 (4) who are still enrolled; and whose other educational outcomes are 17 (5) known to the school district. 18 The school district's or state-chartered 19 D. 20 charter school's annual accountability report shall be adopted by the local school board or governing body of the 21 state-chartered charter school, shall be published no later 22 than November 15 of each year and shall be published at least 23 once each school year in a newspaper of general circulation 24 in the county where the school district or state-chartered 25 HB 453

charter school is located as well as online on the website of 2 the school district or state-chartered charter school. In 3 publication, the report shall be titled "The School District Report Card" or "The Charter School Report Card" and 4 5 disseminated in accordance with guidelines established by the department to ensure effective communication with parents, 6 students, educators, local policymakers and business and community organizations. 8

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The annual accountability report shall include 9 Ε. the names of those members of the local school board or the 10 governing body of the charter school who failed to attend 11 annual mandatory training. 12

The annual accountability report shall include 13 F. data on expenditures for central office administration and 14 15 expenditures for the public schools of the school district or charter school. 16

The department shall create an accountability G. data system through which data from each public school and 18 each school district or state-chartered charter school may be 19 20 compiled and reviewed. The department shall provide the resources to train school district and charter school personnel in the use of the accountability data system. 22

Η. The department shall verify data submitted by the school districts and state-chartered charter schools.

I. At the end of fiscal year 2005, after the

HB 453 Page 6 budget approval cycle, the department shall produce a report to the legislature that shows for all school districts using performance-based program budgeting the relationship between that portion of a school district's program cost generated by each public school in the school district and the budgeted expenditures for each public school in the school district as reported in the district's performance-based program budget. At the end of fiscal year 2006 and subsequent fiscal years, after the budget approval cycle, the department shall report on this relationship in all public schools in all school districts in the state.

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J. When all public schools are participating in performance-based budgeting, the department shall recommend annually to the legislature for inclusion in the general appropriation act the maximum percentage of appropriations that may be expended in each school district for central office administration.

18 K. The department shall disseminate its statewide
19 accountability report to school districts and charter
20 schools; the governor, legislators and other policymakers;
21 and business and economic development organizations.

L. As used in this section, "cohort" means a group
of students who enter grade nine for the first time at the
same time, plus those students who transfer into the group in
later years and minus those students who leave the cohort for HB 453

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documented excusable reasons."

2 SECTION 2. Section 22-13-1.7 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 3 2007, Chapter 348, Section 3) is amended to read: 4 "22-13-1.7. ELEMENTARY PHYSICAL EDUCATION.--5 A. As used in this section: "eligible students" means students in 6 (1)kindergarten through grade six in a public school classified 7 8 by the department as an elementary school; and (2) "physical education" includes programs 9 10 of education through which students participate in activities related to fitness education and assessment; active games and 11 sports; and development of physical capabilities such as 12 motor skills, strength and coordination. 13 Elementary physical education programs that 14 Β. 15 serve eligible students are eligible for funding if those 16 programs meet academic content and performance standards for elementary physical education programs. 17 In granting approval for funding of elementary C. 18 physical education programs, the department shall provide 19 20 that programs are first implemented in public schools that have the highest proportion of students most in need based on 21 the percentage of students eligible for free or reduced-fee 22 lunch or grade-level schools that serve an entire school 23 district and in public schools with available space. If the 24 department determines that an elementary physical education 25 HB 453

1 program is not meeting the academic content and performance 2 standards for elementary physical education programs, the 3 department shall notify the school district that the public school's failure to meet the academic content and performance 4 5 standards will result in the cessation of funding for the following school year. The department shall compile the 6 program results submitted by the school districts each year 7 and make an annual report to the legislative education study 8 committee and the legislature. 9

D. An elementary physical education program thatreceives state financial support shall:

12 (1) provide for the physical education needs13 of students defined in this section; and

14 (2) use teachers with a license endorsement 15 for physical education. The department shall annually 16 determine the programs and the consequent number of students 17 in elementary physical education that will receive state 18 financial support in accordance with funding available in 19 each school year."

20 SECTION 3. Section 22-13-3.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws
21 2001, Chapter 168, Section 1) is amended to read:

"22-13-3.1. EVEN START FAMILY LITERACY
 PROGRAM--CREATED--GUIDELINES--BENCHMARKS, PERFORMANCE
 STANDARDS AND EVALUATIONS.--

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A. The "even start family literacy program" is HB 453

created in the department to provide funding for preschool reading readiness and parenting education. The purpose of the program is to support the educational and developmental needs of students in preschool; address cultural diversity; and provide family support that leads to improved literacy, improved ability for students to succeed in school and economic self-sufficiency. Priority for funding shall be provided to those public schools that have the highest proportion of limited English proficient students, students living in poverty and Native American students.

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B. The department shall develop even start family
literacy program benchmarks and performance standards,
guidelines for program approval and funding approval
criteria. The department shall disseminate the program
information in all public schools and shall provide technical
assistance to public schools in developing proposals.

17 C. The department shall distribute money to public 18 schools with approved even start family literacy programs 19 that meet the specified criteria based upon actual program 20 costs to ensure the implementation of performance based 21 budgeting measures."
