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7	WHEREAS, trauma is the main cause of death for persons
8	between one and forty-four years of age across the nation and
9	in New Mexico; and
10	WHEREAS, at the national level, trauma accounts for
11	thirty percent of all life years lost; and
12	WHEREAS, the economic burden of trauma nationwide is
13	more than six hundred seventy-one billion dollars
14	(\$671,000,000,000) annually; and
15	WHEREAS, in 2007, there were three trauma centers in
16	New Mexico; and
17	WHEREAS, in 2017, there are twelve certified trauma
18	centers and four in development in New Mexico; and
19	WHEREAS, New Mexico has the second highest rate of
20	homicides and suicides combined; and
21	WHEREAS, New Mexico ranks as the eleventh worst state
22	for fall-related deaths, pedestrian fatalities and traffic
23	fatalities; and
24	WHEREAS, access to emergency care in New Mexico is
25	ranked second worst in the nation, with extremely low per

SJM 16 Page 1 capita rates of plastic surgeons, neurosurgeons and registered nurses; and

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WHEREAS, in 2009, the department of health received five million two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$5,250,000) for the development of the trauma system in New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the funding for the trauma system in New Mexico was one million one hundred fifty-five thousand one hundred forty-seven dollars (\$1,155,147) for 2017 for fourteen trauma centers, including two under development; and

WHEREAS, the trauma system infrastructure state funding has been dramatically decreasing since 2009, and no federal funding has been received; and

WHEREAS, the trauma system must be expanded, and no sustainable sources of funding exist;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the secretary of health be requested to convene a trauma system funding task force to study, identify and make recommendations for sustainable sources of funding separate from the general fund for the trauma system in New Mexico; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the trauma system funding task force be requested to identify the cost of continuing operation of the trauma system in New Mexico; and

24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the trauma system funding25 task force be requested to identify the financial and

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1 professional needs of trauma physicians to ensure provision 2 of specialized care for trauma victims statewide; and 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the secretary of health be requested to invite the following experts to join the trauma 4 5 system funding task force: A. two representatives from the department of 6 health: 7 B. at least two members representing trauma 8 physicians; 9 10 C. at least two nurses with trauma program management experience; 11 one representative of the New Mexico nurses 12 D. 13 association; Ε. one representative of the New Mexico medical 14 15 society; and 16 F. one representative of the New Mexico hospital association; and 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the trauma system funding 18 task force be requested to report its findings and 19 20 recommendations for identifying sustainable sources of funding for the trauma system statewide to the interim 21 legislative health and human services committee and 22 legislative finance committee by October 1, 2017; and 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be 24 transmitted to the governor, the secretary of health, the 25
