#### **SUMMARY**

### Synopsis of HHHC Substitute

The House Health and Human Services Committee substitute for House Memorial 56 defines "injectable opioid treatment" and specifies that injectable opioid treatment programs, as part of a comprehensive treatment strategy, provide substantial benefits to long-term heroin users. The substitute also indicates that Spain, Belgium and Canada conducted randomized controlled studies that yielded positive results when implementing heroin-assisted treatment.

### Synopsis of Original Bill

House Memorial 56/HHHCS resolves that the Legislative Health and Human Services Committee hear testimony related to heroin-assisted treatment as a feasible, effective and cost-effective strategy for reducing drug use and drug-related harm among long-term heroin users in New Mexico for whom other treatment programs have failed.
