### **SUMMARY**

# Synopsis of Bill

Senate Joint Memorial 1 would request the Veterans' Services Department to convene a veteran suicide prevention listening task force and to hold meetings in various regions of the state with veterans' organizations, representatives of cities, counties, Native American nations, tribes and pueblos, and the workforce solutions department to assess what additional support or policies are needed to help prevent veteran suicide. The task force would be requested to report its findings to the interim Legislative Military and Veterans' Affairs Committee.

## FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Many of these meetings would likely not fall outside the scope of the Department of Veterans' Services regular duties and the meetings would likely have a minimal fiscal impact.

#### SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

For similar legislation during the 2017 session the Indian Affairs Department stated that The New Mexico Department of Veterans Services, in its 2016 Annual Report, indicates that the veteran population in New Mexico is 170,132, approximately 8.2 percent of the state's

population. Over the last 20 years, suicide death rates in New Mexico have been at least 50 percent higher than national rates. As stated in the memorial, in the U.S. in 2014, there was a disproportionate share of veteran suicide deaths when compared to the overall population (veterans constituted 8.5 percent of the population and accounted for 18 percent of suicide deaths). Additionally, there were 20 veteran suicide deaths daily.
