13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
14	SECTION 1. Section 21-22D-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1995,
15	Chapter 144, Section 18, as amended) is amended to read:
16	"21-22D-3. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Health
17	Professional Loan Repayment Act:
18	A. "department" means the higher education

20	B. "health professional" means a primary care
21	physician, optometrist, podiatrist, physician's assistant,
22	dentist, nurse, member of an allied health profession as
23	defined in the Allied Health Student Loan for Service Act or
24	a licensed or certified health professional as determined by

"loan" means a grant of money to defray the 1 C. 2 costs incidental to a health education, under a contract 3 between the federal government or a commercial lender and a health professional, requiring either repayment of principal 4 5 and interest or repayment in services; D. "nurse in advanced practice" means a registered 6 nurse, including a: 7 8 (1)certified nurse practitioner, certified registered nurse anesthetist or clinical nurse specialist, 9 authorized pursuant to the Nursing Practice Act to function 10 beyond the scope of practice of professional registered 11 nursing; or 12 (2) certified nurse-midwife licensed by the 13 department of health; and 14 Ε. "osteopathic primary care physician" means an 15 osteopathic physician licensed pursuant to the Osteopathic 16 Medicine Act with specialty training in family medicine, 17 general internal medicine, obstetrics, gynecology or general 18 pediatrics." 19 SECTION 2. A new section of the Health Professional 20 Loan Repayment Act is enacted to read: 21 "OSTEOPATHIC PHYSICIAN EXCELLENCE FUND. -- The department 22 shall apply funds appropriated to the department from the 23 osteopathic physician excellence fund established pursuant to 24 Section 3 of this 2019 act exclusively for health 25

SECTION 3. A new section of the Health Professional Loan Repayment Act is enacted to read:

"OSTEOPATHIC PHYSICIAN EXCELLENCE FUND--CREATION--7 8 ADMINISTRATION--APPROPRIATION.--The "osteopathic physician excellence fund" is created in the state treasury to support 9 awards established through the Health Professional Loan 10 Repayment Act to osteopathic primary care physicians who 11 practice in areas of New Mexico that the department has 12 designated as underserved. The fund consists of license 13 application and renewal surcharges pursuant to Section 14 61-10-6.1 NMSA 1978, appropriations, gifts, grants, donations 15 and income from investment of the fund. Any income earned on 16 investment of the fund shall remain in the fund. Money in 17 the fund shall not revert to any other fund at the end of a 18 fiscal year. The fund shall be administered by the 19 department, and money in the fund is appropriated to the 20 department to make awards established through the Health 21 Professional Loan Repayment Act to osteopathic primary care 22 physicians who practice in areas of New Mexico that the 23 department has designated as underserved. Disbursements from 24 the fund shall be made only upon warrants drawn by the 25

1 secretary of finance and administration pursuant to vouchers 2 signed by the secretary of higher education or the 3 secretary's authorized representative." SECTION 4. Section 61-10-6.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 4 2016, Chapter 90, Section 7) is amended to read: 5 "61-10-6.1. FEES.--The board shall charge the following 6 fees; provided that all fees are nonrefundable and, except 7 8 for those fees collected pursuant to Paragraph (10) of Subsection A of this section, shall be used by the board to 9 carry out its duties: 10 A. pertaining to osteopathic physicians: 11 (1) an application fee not to exceed one 12 thousand dollars (\$1,000) for triennial licensure of an 13 osteopathic physician pursuant to Section 61-10-12 NMSA 1978; 14 a triennial osteopathic physician (2) 15 licensure renewal fee not to exceed one thousand dollars 16 (\$1,000); 17 a fee not to exceed seventy-five dollars (3) 18 (\$75.00) for placing an osteopathic physician license on 19 inactive status; 20 (4) a late fee not to exceed: 21 (a) two hundred dollars (\$200) for 22 osteopathic physicians who fail to renew their licenses on or 23 before July 1 of the year in which their triennial licenses 24 are due for renewal but who renew on or before September 29 25 SPAC/SB 21 Page 4

1 of that year; and 2 (b) four hundred dollars (\$400) for 3 osteopathic physicians who renew their licenses after September 29; 4 (5) a reinstatement fee not to exceed five 5 hundred dollars (\$500) for reinstatement of a revoked, 6 suspended or inactive osteopathic physician license; 7 8 (6) a temporary license fee not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100); 9 a postgraduate osteopathic physician (7) 10 training license fee not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00); 11 an osteopathic physician telemedicine (8) 12 triennial license fee not to exceed four hundred dollars 13 (\$400); 14 (9) an impaired physician fee not to exceed 15 one hundred dollars (\$100); and 16 (10) a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100) to 17 accompany fees for application for and renewal of osteopathic 18 physician licensure for deposit in the osteopathic physician 19 excellence fund pursuant to Section 3 of this 2019 act; 20 B. pertaining to osteopathic physician assistants: 21 (1)a biennial license fee not to exceed 22 four hundred fifty dollars (\$450); 23 a registration of new supervision fee (2) 24 that is equal to one-half of the biennial license fee for 25
