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17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
18	SECTION 1. A new section of the Public School Finance Act
19	is enacted to read:
20	"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] BEGINNING TEACHER MENTORSHIP FUND
21	CREATEDThe "beginning teacher mentorship fund" is created as
22	a nonreverting fund in the state treasury. The fund consists
23	of appropriations, gifts, grants and donations. Money in the
24	fund is subject to appropriation by the legislature to provide
25	funding to school districts and charter schools for their
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beginning teacher mentorship programs. Expenditures from the fund shall be by warrant of the secretary of finance and administration pursuant to vouchers signed by the secretary of public education or the secretary's authorized representative."

SECTION 2. Section 22-10A-9 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Chapter 153, Section 40, as amended) is amended to read:

"22-10A-9. TEACHER MENTORSHIP PROGRAM FOR BEGINNING TEACHERS--PURPOSE--DEPARTMENT DUTIES.--

A. The purpose of the teacher mentorship program is to provide beginning teachers with an effective transition into the teaching field, to build on their initial preparation and to ensure their success in teaching; to improve the achievement of students; and to retain capable teachers in the classroom and to remove teachers who show little promise of success.

B. The department shall develop a framework for a teacher mentorship program for all [first-year] beginning teachers. The program shall provide mentorship services by level two or level three mentors to the [first-year] beginning teacher for the full school year. [If sufficient mentorship funds are available, the department may provide funding for mentorship services that extend beyond the first year if the local superintendent or charter school administrator certifies to the secretary that further formal mentorship of a beginning teacher will accomplish the purposes of Subsection A of this section; provided that the state shall not pay for more than

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1 three years' mentorship for any beginning teacher.] 2 C. The department shall work with licensed school 3 employees, representatives from teacher preparation programs and the higher education department to establish the framework. 4 The framework shall include: 5 D. individual support and assistance for each 6 (1)7 beginning teacher from a designated mentor; 8 (2) structured training for mentors; 9 (3) an ongoing, formative evaluation that is used for the improvement of teaching practice; 10 (4) procedures for a summative evaluation of 11 12 beginning teachers' performance during at least the first three years of teaching, including annual assessment of suitability 13 for license renewal, and for final assessment of beginning 14 teachers seeking level two licensure; 15 (5) support from local school boards or 16 governing bodies of charter schools, school administrators and 17 other school district or charter school personnel; and 18 (6) regular review and evaluation of the 19 20 teacher mentorship program. 9 (4) distribute [no less than fifty percent of available funds] up to two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per year 10 per beginning teacher from the beginning teacher mentorship 11 12 fund for mentorship programs to school districts and charter schools; provided that no less than fifty percent of available 13 14 funds shall be distributed on or before September 15 of each fiscal year according to the estimated number of teachers 15 eligible to participate in [a] their mentorship [program on the 16 fortieth day of the school year] programs and, on or before 17 January 15 of each fiscal year, distribute [the balance of the 18 19 available funds] funding based on the actual number of eligible 20 teachers participating in a mentorship program on the [fortieth day] first reporting date of the school year, adjusted for any 21 over- or under-estimation made in the first allocation. 22

[F. The department shall require that teacher preparation programs collaborate with colleges of arts and sciences and high schools to develop a model to provide

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1	mentorship services with structured supervision and feedback to
2	each of their graduates who have obtained a teaching position
3	in a public high school, including charter schools; develop
4	cost estimates; and provide recommendations to the legislative
5	education study committee by November 1, 2007. The model shall
6	provide for the following:

3	SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION Six million two hundred
4	thousand dollars (\$6,200,000) is appropriated from the general
5	fund to the beginning teacher mentorship fund for expenditure
6	in fiscal year 2021. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance
7	remaining at the end of a fiscal year shall not revert to the
8	general fund.
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
