14	INSURANCE COSTS FOR MEMBERS OF THE NEW MEXICO MOUNTED PATROL;
15	MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.
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17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
18	SECTION 1. Section 31-1-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1972,
19	Chapter 71, Section 5, as amended) is amended to read:
20	"31-1-2. DEFINITIONSUnless a specific meaning is
21	given, as used in the Criminal Procedure Act:
22	A. "accused" means any person charged with the
23	violation of any law of this state imposing a criminal penalty;
24	B. "bail bond" is a contract between surety and the
25	state to the effect that the accused and the surety will appear
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C. "defendant" means any person accused of a violation of any law of this state imposing a criminal penalty;

D. "felony" means any crime so designated by law or if upon conviction thereof a sentence of death or of imprisonment for a term of one year or more is authorized;

E. "person", unless a contrary intention appears, means any individual, estate, trust, receiver, cooperative association, club, corporation, company, firm, partnership, joint venture, syndicate or other entity;

F. "police officer", "law enforcement officer",
 "peace officer" or "officer" means:

(1) any full-time salaried or certified parttime salaried officer who by virtue of office or public employment is vested by law with the duty to maintain the public peace; or

(2) a member of the New Mexico mounted patrol who has satisfactorily completed a basic law enforcement training program pursuant to Section 29-6-4.1 NMSA 1978 and who has been requested to provide law enforcement assistance by the New Mexico state police or another law enforcement or state regulatory agency pursuant to Sections 29-6-4 and 29-6-5 NMSA 1978;

G. "recognizance" means any obligation of record .216270.4

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entered into before a court requiring the accused to appear at all appropriate times or forfeit any bail and be subject to criminal penalty for failure to appear;

H. "release on personal recognizance" or "release on own recognizance" means the release of a defendant without bail, bail bond or sureties upon the defendant's promise to appear at all appropriate times;

I. "rules of civil procedure" means rules of civil procedure for the district courts of the state of New Mexico, as may be amended from time to time;

J. "rules of criminal procedure" means rules of criminal procedure for the district courts, magistrate courts and municipal courts adopted by the New Mexico supreme court, as may be amended from time to time;

K. "misdemeanor" means any offense for which the authorized penalty upon conviction is imprisonment in excess of six months but less than one year; and

L. "petty misdemeanor" means any offense so designated by law or if upon conviction a sentence of imprisonment for six months or less is authorized."

SECTION 2. Section 35-6-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1968, Chapter 62, Section 94, as amended) is amended to read:

"law enforcement officer" means: (1) a full-time salaried public employee of a governmental entity, or a certified part-time salaried police officer employed by a governmental entity, whose principal duties under law are to hold in custody any person accused of a criminal offense, to maintain public order or to make arrests for crimes; [<del>or</del>] (2) members of the national guard when called to active duty by the governor; <u>or</u> (3) a member of the New Mexico mounted patrol

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1 Chapter 213, Section 3, as amended) is amended to read: "66-8-124. ARRESTING OFFICER TO BE IN UNIFORM.--2 3 No person shall be arrested for violating the Α. Motor Vehicle Code or other law relating to motor vehicles 4 punishable as a misdemeanor except by: 5 (1) a commissioned, salaried peace officer 6 7 who, at the time of arrest, is wearing a uniform clearly indicating the peace officer's official status; or 8 9 (2) a member of the New Mexico mounted patrol who has satisfactorily completed a basic law enforcement 10 training program pursuant to Section 29-6-4.1 NMSA 1978, who 11 12 has been requested to provide law enforcement assistance by the New Mexico state police or another law enforcement or state 13 14 regulatory agency pursuant to Sections 29-6-4 and 29-6-5 NMSA 1978 and who, at the time of arrest, is wearing a uniform 15 clearly indicating the member's official status. 16 17

B. Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection A of this section, a municipality may provide by ordinance that uniformed private security guards may be commissioned by the local police agency to issue parking citations for violations of clearly and properly marked fire zones and access zones for persons with significant mobility limitation. Prior to the commissioning of any security guard, the employer of the security guard shall agree in writing with the local police agency to the commissioning of the employer's security guard. .216270.4

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1 The employer of any security guard commissioned under the 2 provisions of this section shall be liable for the actions of 3 that security guard in carrying out the security guard's duties pursuant to that commission. Notwithstanding the provisions of 4 5 the Tort Claims Act, private security guards commissioned under this section shall not be deemed public employees under that 6 7 act." 8 SECTION 5. Section 66-8-125 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1978, 9 Chapter 35, Section 533) is amended to read: "66-8-125. ARREST WITHOUT WARRANT .--10 Members of the New Mexico state police, sheriffs 11 Α. 12 and their salaried deputies, [and] members of any municipal police force and members of the New Mexico mounted patrol who 13 14 have satisfactorily completed a basic law enforcement training program pursuant to Section 29-6-4.1 NMSA 1978 and who have 15 been requested to provide law enforcement assistance by the New 16 17 Mexico state police or another law enforcement or state regulatory agency pursuant to Sections 29-6-4 and 29-6-5 NMSA 18 19 1978 may arrest without warrant any person: 20 present at the scene of a motor vehicle (1)accident; 21 on a highway when charged with theft of a (2) 22 motor vehicle; or 23 (3) charged with crime in another 24 25 jurisdiction, upon receipt of a message giving the name or a .216270.4 - 10 -

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reasonably accurate description of the person wanted, the crime alleged and a statement [he] <u>that the person</u> is likely to flee the jurisdiction of [the] <u>this</u> state.

B. To arrest without warrant, the arresting officer must have reasonable grounds, based on personal investigation, which may include information from eyewitnesses, to believe the person arrested has committed a crime.

8 C. Members of the New Mexico state police, sheriffs 9 and their salaried deputies, [and] members of any municipal police force and members of the New Mexico mounted patrol who 10 have satisfactorily completed a basic law enforcement training 11 program pursuant to Section 29-6-4.1 NMSA 1978 and who have 12 been requested to provide law enforcement assistance by the New 13 14 Mexico state police or another law enforcement or state regulatory agency pursuant to Sections 29-6-4 and 29-6-5 NMSA 15 1978 may not make [arrest] arrests for traffic violations if 16 not in uniform; however, nothing in this section shall be 17 construed to prohibit the arrest, without warrant, by a peace 18 19 officer of any person when probable cause exists to believe 20 that a felony crime has been committed or in non-traffic cases." 21

SECTION 6. APPROPRIATION.--Ninety-four thousand five hundred sixty dollars (\$94,560) is appropriated from the general fund to the risk management division of the general services department for expenditure in fiscal year 2021 for the .216270.4

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1	costs of general liability, civil rights, tort claims and
2	workers' compensation insurance coverage for members of the New
3	Mexico mounted patrol. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance
4	remaining at the end of fiscal year 2021 shall revert to the
5	general fund.
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
