2 RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT; CHANGING THE CURRENT AMOUNTS DISTRIBUTED FROM THE LAW ENFORCEMENT PROTECTION FUND; 3 PROVIDING DISTRIBUTIONS FROM THE LAW ENFORCEMENT PROTECTION 4 5 FUND TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY TO OFFSET COSTS 6 INCURRED DUE TO CERTAIN SPECIAL DEPLOYMENTS; REQUIRING CERTIFIED LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS WHO WORK AS SCHOOL 7 RESOURCE OFFICERS TO BE SPECIFICALLY TRAINED FOR THOSE 8 POSITIONS; ALLOWING SCHOOL DISTRICT POLICE DEPARTMENTS THAT 9 10 HAVE FULL-TIME SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS TO RECEIVE FUNDING FROM THE LAW ENFORCEMENT PROTECTION FUND. 11

AN ACT

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS AS SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS--TRAINING REQUIRED.--

A. As used in this section, "school resource officer" means a commissioned and certified law enforcement officer who is designated to be responsible for school safety and crime prevention and the appropriate response to crimes in public schools and has completed the training specified in Subsection B of this section.

B. A law enforcement officer who is or will be
assigned as a school resource officer shall receive specific
training for the duty, including instruction on the
following:

1 (1) the differences in successful law 2 enforcement when conducted inside a school environment, 3 including understanding the adolescent brain, crisis management and de-escalation techniques; 4 tools to be a positive role model for 5 (2) youth, including mentoring and informal counseling 6 techniques; 7 8 (3) the school resource officer's role and responsibilities to school personnel and students and their 9 families and strategies for connecting students and families 10 to appropriate resources that will assist students to succeed 11 in school, including strategies for mitigating truancy; 12 (4) a variety of instructional techniques as 13 well as classroom management tools to provide law-related 14 education to students; 15 (5) an understanding of adolescent 16 development and adolescent mental health disorders and 17 treatment; and 18 (6) identification and response to students 19 who are suspected of having a mental health need, including 20 critical skills and capacity for appropriately responding to 21 behavior issues that are typically observed among adolescents 22 with mental health needs. 23 C. Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, a law 24 enforcement officer who: 25

is assigned as a school resource officer (1)shall complete the training required in Subsection B of this section within twelve months of being assigned as a school resource officer; or

(2) was serving as a school resource officer prior to the 2022-2023 school year and who has not received specific training for the position of school resource officer shall complete the training required in Subsection B of this section no later than July 1, 2023.

The school resource officer training shall be D. provided by or approved by the New Mexico law enforcement academy in consultation with the public education department.

SECTION 2. Section 29-13-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983, Chapter 289, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read:

"29-13-2. PURPOSE OF ACT.--The purpose of the Law 15 Enforcement Protection Fund Act is to provide for the equitable distribution of money to state police, municipal police, university police, tribal police, county sheriff's and school district police departments for use in the maintenance and improvement of those departments in order to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of law enforcement services and to sustain at a reasonable level the payments 22 available to the surviving eligible family members of a peace officer killed in the line of duty."

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SECTION 3. Section 29-13-2.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws

1993, Chapter 179, Section 4, as amended) is amended to read: 1 2 "29-13-2.1. DEFINITIONS.--As used in the Law 3 Enforcement Protection Fund Act: "academy" means the New Mexico law enforcement Α. 4 5 academy; Β. "division" means the local government division 6 of the department of finance and administration; 7 8 C. "fund" means the law enforcement protection fund; 9 "governmental entity" means the academy, the D. 10 department of public safety, a municipality, a county, a 11 university, a tribe or a school district; 12 "school district police department" means a Ε. 13 department of commissioned law enforcement officers who are 14 charged with preventing, investigating and solving crimes on 15 school district property; 16 F. "tribal police department" means the police 17 department of a tribe that has entered into an agreement with 18 the department of public safety pursuant to Section 29-1-11 19 NMSA 1978; 20 "tribe" means an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo G. 21 located wholly or partly in New Mexico; and 22 н. SECTION 4. Section 29-13-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 179, Section 6, as amended by Laws 2017, Chapter 1, Section 2 and by Laws 2017, Chapter 35, Section 3) is amended to read:

"29-13-4. DETERMINATION OF NEEDS AND RATE OF DISTRIBUTION.--

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A. Annually on or before April 15, the division
shall consider and determine the relative needs as requested
by tribal, municipal, school district and university police
departments, county sheriff's departments, the department of
public safety and the academy for money in the fund in the
succeeding fiscal year pursuant to the provisions of
Subsections C and E of this section.

B. As necessary during the year, the division 14 shall transfer an amount from the fund to the peace 15 officers', New Mexico mounted patrol members' and reserve 16 police officers' survivors fund that enables the balance of 17 the peace officers', New Mexico mounted patrol members' and 18 reserve police officers' survivors fund to be maintained at a 19 minimum balance of three hundred fifty thousand dollars 20 (\$350,000). 21

C. The division shall determine the rate ofdistribution of money in the fund as follows:

(1) all municipal police, school districtpolice and county sheriff's departments shall be entitled to

a rate of distribution of forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000);

3 (2) university police departments shall be
4 entitled to a rate of distribution of forty-five thousand
5 dollars (\$45,000);

(3) the academy shall be entitled to a rate of distribution of twenty-four thousand five hundred dollars (\$24,500) to carry out the purposes of Section 29-7-7.7 NMSA 1978;

(4) tribal police departments shall be 10 entitled, unless allocations are adjusted pursuant to the 11 provisions of Subsection D of this section, to one thousand 12 dollars (\$1,000) for each commissioned peace officer in the 13 tribe. To be counted as a commissioned peace officer for the 14 purposes of this paragraph, a commissioned peace officer 15 shall have been assigned to duty and have worked in New 16 Mexico for no fewer than two hundred days in the calendar 17 year immediately prior to the date of payment. Payments 18 shall be made for only those divisions of the tribal police 19 departments that perform services in New Mexico. A tribal 20 police department shall not be eligible for any disbursement 21 under the fund if commissioned peace officers cite non-22 Indians into the tribal court for civil or criminal 23 citations; 24

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(5) municipal, school district and

1 university police and county sheriff's departments shall be 2 entitled, unless allocations are adjusted pursuant to the 3 provisions of Subsection D of this section, to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each police officer or sheriff's deputy 4 employed full time by that department who has been certified 5 by the academy, or by a regional law enforcement training 6 facility in the state certified by the director of the 7 8 academy, as a police officer or has been authorized to act as a New Mexico peace officer pursuant to the provisions of 9 Section 29-1-11 NMSA 1978; and 10

11 (6) municipal police, sheriff's and school 12 district police departments that assign officers as school 13 resource officers shall be entitled to one thousand dollars 14 (\$1,000) for each assigned school resource officer's training 15 pursuant to Section 1 of this 2020 act.

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D. After distributions are determined in accordance with Subsection A, Subsection B and Paragraphs (1), (2), (3) and (6) of Subsection C of this section, if the balance in the fund is insufficient to permit the total allocations provided by Paragraphs (4) and (5) of Subsection C of this section, the division shall reduce that allocation to the maximum amount permitted by available money.

E. After all distributions have been made in accordance with Subsections A through D of this section, and if the balance in the fund is sufficient, the department of

public safety shall be entitled to a rate of distribution of not more than two million dollars (\$2,000,000)."

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SECTION 5. Section 29-13-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983, Chapter 289, Section 5, as amended) is amended to read:

"29-13-5. DETERMINATION OF NEEDS--REVIEW.--No later 5 than May 1 of each year, the division shall notify in writing 6 each affected municipal police, school district police, 7 8 university police, tribal police and county sheriff's department, the department of public safety and the academy 9 of its determination of money to be distributed pursuant to 10 the provisions of Section 29-13-4 NMSA 1978. Any affected 11 governmental entity may appeal that determination by filing a 12 notice of appeal with the secretary of finance and 13 administration no later than May 15. If an appeal is filed, 14 the secretary of finance and administration shall review the 15 determination of the division in an informal and summary 16 proceeding and shall certify the result of the appeal to the 17 division no later than June 30, and the division shall adjust 18 its determination accordingly. If no appeal is filed, the 19 original determination of the division shall be final and 20 binding and not subject to further review." 21

SECTION 6. Section 29-13-7 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983, Chapter 289, Section 7, as amended) is amended to read:

"29-13-7. EXPENDITURE LIMITATION--CONTROL.--

A. Except as provided for the academy and the

1 department of public safety in Subsections B and C of this 2 section, amounts distributed from the fund shall be expended 3 only for the following: (1) the repair and purchase of law 4 enforcement apparatus and equipment, including the financing 5 and refinancing thereof, that meet minimum nationally 6 recognized standards; 7 8 (2) the purchase of law enforcement equipment, including protective vests, for police dogs; 9 expenses associated with advanced law (3) 10 enforcement planning and training; 11 (4) maintaining the balance of the peace 12 officers', New Mexico mounted patrol members' and reserve 13 police officers' survivors fund at a minimum amount of three 14 hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000); 15 (5) complying with match or contribution 16 requirements for the receipt of federal funds relating to 17 criminal justice programs; 18 (6) no more than fifty percent of the 19 replacement salaries of municipal and county law enforcement 20 personnel of municipalities or counties participating in 21 basic law enforcement training; and 22 (7) contingent upon the availability of 23 funding and until June 30, 2021, a law enforcement officer 24 retention payment in the amount of seven thousand five 25

hundred dollars (\$7,500); provided that: 1 2 the distribution is requested by a (a) 3 municipality or county law enforcement agency that on January 1, 2018 had a staffing vacancy rate of at least ten percent 4 to retain a law enforcement officer who is certified in 5 accordance with the Law Enforcement Training Act and has at 6 least twenty years of actual service credit earned under a 7 8 municipal police member coverage plan as determined by the public employees retirement association; 9 (b) the municipality or county law 10 enforcement agency provides seven thousand five hundred 11 dollars (\$7,500) in matching funds to the law enforcement 12 officer; and 13 the distribution and the matching (c) 14 funds paid to a law enforcement officer shall not constitute 15 the officer's base salary or wages and shall not be 16 considered to be salary or otherwise be used to determine a 17 pension for the purposes of the Public Employees Retirement 18 Act. 19 B. For the academy, amounts distributed from the 20 fund shall be expended only for providing tourniquet and 21 trauma kits and training on the use of tourniquet and trauma 22

24 C. The amount distributed to the department of 25 public safety:

kits pursuant to Section 29-7-7.7 NMSA 1978.

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1	(1) shall:	
2	(a) be used only to offset overtime-	
3	pay-related expenses incurred directly by the department of	
4	public safety from the special deployment of state police	
5	officers or other emergency assistance to counties or	
6	municipalities in response to critical circumstances as	
7	authorized by the governor; and	
8	(b) not be expended to hire new	
9	personnel; and	
10	(2) may be expended for costs, including	
11	travel, fuel, overtime, per diem and ammunition.	
12	D. Amounts distributed from the fund shall be	
13	expended only pursuant to approved budgets and upon duly	
14	executed vouchers approved as required by law."
