274, SECTION 16 ARE IMPOSING INCREMENTS OF THE MUNICIPAL GROSS RECEIPTS TAX AND THE COUNTY GROSS RECEIPTS TAX.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. Section 7-1-14 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1969, Chapter 145, Section 1, as amended) is repealed and a new Section 7-1-14 NMSA 1978 is enacted to read:

"7-1-14. BUSINESS LOCATION INSTRUCTIONS FOR PURPOSES OF REPORTING GROSS RECEIPTS AND USE--LOCATION-CODE DATABASE AND LOCATION-RATE DATABASE.--

For purposes of the Gross Receipts and 11 Α. Compensating Tax Act, Interstate Telecommunications Gross 12 Receipts Tax Act, Leased Vehicle Gross Receipts Tax Act and 13 any act authorizing the imposition of a local option gross 14 receipts or compensating tax, a person that has gross 15 receipts and a person using property or services in New 16 Mexico in a taxable manner shall report the gross receipts to 17 the proper business location as provided in this section. 18

B. The business location for gross receipts from
the sale, lease or granting of a license to use real property
located in New Mexico, and any related deductions, shall be
the location of the property.

C. The business location for gross receipts from the sale or license of tangible personal property, and any related deductions, shall be at the following locations:

(1) if the property is received by the
 purchaser at the New Mexico business location of the seller,
 the location of the seller;

(2) if the property is not received by the purchaser at a business location of the seller, the location indicated by instructions for delivery to the purchaser, or the purchaser's donee, when known to the seller;

8 (3) if Paragraphs (1) and (2) of this
9 subsection do not apply, the location indicated by an address
10 for the purchaser available from the business records of the
11 seller that are maintained in the ordinary course of
12 business; provided that use of the address does not
13 constitute bad faith;

(4) if Paragraphs (1) through (3) of this
subsection do not apply, the location for the purchaser
obtained during consummation of the sale, including the
address of a purchaser's payment instrument, if no other
address is available; provided that use of this address does
not constitute bad faith; or

(5) if Paragraphs (1) through (4) of this subsection do not apply, including a circumstance in which the seller is without sufficient information to apply those standards, the location from which the property was shipped or transmitted.

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D. The business location for gross receipts from HB 326/a

the lease of tangible personal property, including vehicles, other transportation equipment and other mobile tangible personal property, and any related deductions, shall be the location of primary use of the property, as indicated by the address for the property provided by the lessee that is available to the lessor from the lessor's records maintained in the ordinary course of business; provided that use of this address does not constitute bad faith. The primary business location shall not be altered by intermittent use at different locations, such as use of business property that accompanies employees on business trips and service calls.

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E. The business location for gross receipts from the sale, lease or license of franchises, and any related deductions, shall be where the franchise is used.

F. The business location for gross receipts from the performance or sale of the following services, and any related deductions, shall be at the following locations:

(1) for professional services performed in New Mexico, other than construction-related services, or performed outside New Mexico when the product of the service is initially used in New Mexico, the location of the performer of the service or seller of the product of the service, as appropriate;

24 (2) for construction services and25 construction-related services performed for a construction HB 326/a

1 project in New Mexico, the location of the construction site; 2 for services with respect to the selling (3) 3 of real estate located in New Mexico, the location of the real estate; 4 5 (4) for transportation of persons or property in, into or from New Mexico, the location where the 6 person or property enters the vehicle; and 7 (5) for services other than those described 8 in Paragraphs (1) through (4) of this subsection, the 9 10 location where the product of the service is delivered. G. Except as provided in Subsection H of this 11 section, uses of property or services subject to the 12 compensating tax shall be reported at the business location 13 at which gross receipts would have been required to be 14 15 reported had the transaction been subject to the gross 16 receipts tax. If a person subject to the compensating tax can 17 н. demonstrate that the first use upon which compensating tax is 18 imposed occurred at a time and place different from the time 19 20 and place of the purchase, then compensating tax shall be reported at the business location of the first use. 21 I. The secretary shall designate codes to identify 22 the business locations for a person's gross receipts, or use 23

for purchases subject to the compensating tax, and deductions

related to those receipts or that use shall be reported.

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1 The secretary shall develop a location-code J. 2 database that provides the business location codes designated 3 pursuant to Subsection I of this section. The secretary shall also develop and provide to taxpayers a location-rate 4 5 database that sets out the tax rates applicable to business locations within the state, by address, and sellers who 6 properly rely on this database shall not be liable for any 7 additional tax due to the use of an incorrect rate. 8

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K. As used in this section:

(1) "business location" means the code designated by the department to identify business locations and required to be used to report the gross receipts, or use for purchases subject to the compensating tax, and deductions related to those receipts or that use;

(2) "gross receipts" means, as applicable,
"gross receipts" as used in the Gross Receipts and
Compensating Tax Act and the Leased Vehicle Gross Receipts
Tax Act and "interstate telecommunications gross receipts" in
the Interstate Telecommunications Gross Receipts Tax Act;

(3) "in-person service" means a service
physically provided in person by the service provider, where
the customer or the customer's real or tangible personal
property upon which the service is performed is in the same
location as the service provider at the time the service is
performed; and

(4) "professional service" means a service, other than an in-person service, that requires either an advanced degree from an accredited post-secondary educational institution or a license from the state to perform."

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SECTION 2. Section 7-1-29 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1965, Chapter 248, Section 31, as amended) is amended to read:

"7-1-29. AUTHORITY TO MAKE REFUNDS OR CREDITS.--

In response to a claim for refund, credit or 8 Α. 9 rebate made as provided in Section 7-1-26 NMSA 1978, but 10 before a court acquires jurisdiction of the matter, the secretary or the secretary's delegate may authorize payment 11 to a person in the amount of the credit or rebate claimed or 12 refund an overpayment of tax determined by the secretary or 13 the secretary's delegate to have been erroneously made by the 14 15 person, together with allowable interest. A payment of a credit rebate claimed or a refund of tax and interest 16 erroneously paid amounting to twenty thousand dollars 17 (\$20,000) or more shall be made with the prior approval of 18 the attorney general, except that the secretary or the 19 20 secretary's delegate may make refunds with respect to the Oil and Gas Severance Tax Act, the Oil and Gas Conservation Tax 21 Act, the Oil and Gas Emergency School Tax Act, the Oil and 22 Gas Ad Valorem Production Tax Act, the Natural Gas Processors 23 Tax Act or the Oil and Gas Production Equipment Ad Valorem 24 Tax Act, Section 7-13-17 NMSA 1978 and the Cigarette Tax Act 25

without the prior approval of the attorney general regardless of the amount.

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B. Pursuant to the final order of the district court, the court of appeals, the supreme court of New Mexico or a federal court, from which order, appeal or review is not successfully taken, adjudging that a person has properly claimed a credit or rebate or made an overpayment of tax, the secretary shall authorize the payment to the person of the amount thereof.

C. In the discretion of the secretary, any amount 10 of credit or rebate to be paid or tax to be refunded may be 11 offset against any amount of tax for which the person due to 12 receive the credit, rebate payment or refund is liable. 13 The secretary or the secretary's delegate shall give notice to 14 15 the taxpayer that the credit, rebate payment or refund will be made in this manner, and the taxpayer shall be entitled to 16 interest pursuant to Section 7-1-68 NMSA 1978 until the tax 17 liability is credited with the credit, rebate or refund 18 amount. 19

D. In an audit by the department or a managed audit covering multiple reporting periods in which both underpayments and overpayments of a tax have been made in different reporting periods, the department shall credit the tax overpayments against the underpayments; provided that the taxpayer files a claim for refund of the overpayments. An

overpayment shall be applied as a credit first to the earliest underpayment and then to succeeding underpayments. An underpayment of tax to which an overpayment is credited pursuant to this section shall be deemed paid in the period in which the overpayment was made or the period to which the overpayment was credited against an underpayment, whichever is later. If the overpayments credited pursuant to this section exceed the underpayments of a tax, the amount of the net overpayment for the periods covered in the audit shall be refunded to the taxpayer.

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11 When a taxpayer makes a payment identified to a Ε. particular return or assessment, and the department 12 determines that the payment exceeds the amount due pursuant 13 to that return or assessment, the secretary may apply the 14 15 excess to the taxpayer's other liabilities pursuant to the 16 tax acts to which the return or assessment applies, without requiring the taxpayer to file a claim for a refund. 17 The liability to which an overpayment is applied pursuant to this 18 section shall be deemed paid in the period in which the 19 20 overpayment was made or the period to which the overpayment was applied, whichever is later. 21

F. If the department determines, upon review of an original or amended income tax return, corporate income and franchise tax return, estate tax return, special fuels excise tax return or oil and gas tax return, that there has been an

overpayment of tax for the taxable period to which the return or amended return relates in excess of the amount due to be refunded to the taxpayer pursuant to the provisions of Subsection K of Section 7-1-26 NMSA 1978, the department may refund that excess amount to the taxpayer without requiring the taxpayer to file a refund claim.

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G. Records of refunds and credits made in excess of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) shall be available for inspection by the public. The department shall keep such records for a minimum of three years from the date of the refund or credit.

In response to a timely refund claim pursuant 12 Η. to Section 7-1-26 NMSA 1978 and notwithstanding any other 13 provision of the Tax Administration Act, the secretary or the 14 15 secretary's delegate may refund or credit a portion of an assessment of tax paid, including applicable penalties and 16 interest representing the amount of tax previously paid by 17 another person on behalf of the taxpayer on the same 18 transaction; provided that the requirements of equitable 19 20 recoupment are met. For purposes of this subsection, the refund claim may be filed by the taxpayer to whom the 21 assessment was issued or by another person who claims to have 22 previously paid the tax on behalf of the taxpayer. Prior to 23 granting the refund or credit, the secretary may require a 24 waiver of all rights to claim a refund or credit of the tax 25

previously paid by another person paying a tax on behalf of the taxpayer.

3 I. If, as a result of an audit by the department or a managed audit, a person is determined to owe gross 4 5 receipts tax on receipts from the sale of property or 6 services, the department may credit against the amount owed an amount of compensating tax paid by the purchaser if the 7 8 person can demonstrate that the purchaser timely paid the 9 compensating tax on the same property or services. The 10 credit provided by this subsection shall not be denied solely because the purchaser cannot timely file for a refund of the 11 compensating tax paid and, if the credit is to be granted, 12 the department shall require, for the purpose of granting the 13 credit, that the purchaser give up any right to claim a 14 15 refund of that tax."

SECTION 3. Section 7-4-10 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 153, Section 1, as amended) is amended to read:

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"7-4-10. APPORTIONMENT OF BUSINESS INCOME.--

A. Except as provided in Subsections B and C of this section, all business income shall be apportioned to this state by multiplying the income by a fraction, the numerator of which is the property factor plus the payroll factor plus the sales factor and the denominator of which is three.

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B. If eighty percent or more of the New Mexico

numerators of the property and payroll factors for a filing group, or for a taxpayer that is not a member of a filing group, are employed in manufacturing or operating a computer processing facility, the filing group or the taxpayer may elect to have business income apportioned to this state by multiplying the income by the sales factor for the taxable year.

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8 C. If a filing group, or a taxpayer that is not a 9 member of a filing group, has a headquarters operation in New 10 Mexico, the filing group or the taxpayer may elect to have 11 business income apportioned to this state by multiplying the 12 income by the sales factor for the taxable year.

D. To elect the method of apportionment provided by Subsection B or C of this section, the taxpayer shall notify the department of the election, in writing, no later than the date on which the taxpayer files the return for the first taxable year to which the election will apply. The election shall apply as follows:

(1) if the election is made for taxable
years beginning prior to January 1, 2020, to the taxable year
in which the election is made and to each taxable year
thereafter for three years, or until the taxable year ending
prior to January 1, 2020, whichever is earlier;

(2) if the election is made for a taxable year beginning on or after January 1, 2020, to the taxable

including hydrocarbons; or 1 2 (e) processing or preparation of meals for immediate consumption; and 3 "operating a computer processing 4 (4) 5 facility" means managing the necessary and ancillary activities for the operation of a facility primarily used to 6 process data or information, but does not include managing 7 8 the operation of facilities that are predominantly used to 9 support sales of tangible property or the provision of 10 banking, financial or professional services." "Construction-related service" 11 does not include general business services, such as legal or 12 accounting services, equipment maintenance or real estate 13 sales commissions." 14

SECTION 5. Section 7-9-52 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1969, Chapter 144, Section 42, as amended) is amended to read:

"7-9-52. DEDUCTION--GROSS RECEIPTS TAX--SALE OF CONSTRUCTION SERVICES AND CONSTRUCTION-RELATED SERVICES TO PERSONS ENGAGED IN THE CONSTRUCTION BUSINESS.--

A. Receipts from selling a construction service or a construction-related service may be deducted from gross receipts if the sale is made to a person engaged in the construction business who delivers a nontaxable transaction certificate to the person performing the construction service or a construction-related service.

The buyer delivering the nontaxable transaction 2 certificate shall have the construction services or 3 construction-related services directly contracted for or billed to: 4 5 (1) a construction project that is subject 6 to the gross receipts tax upon its completion or upon the completion of the overall construction project of which it is 7 8 a part; 9 (2) a construction project that is subject 10 to the gross receipts tax upon the sale in the ordinary course of business of the real property upon which it was 11 constructed; or 12 a construction project that is located 13 (3) 14 on the tribal territory of an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo." 15 SECTION 6. Section 7-9-117 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2019, 16 Chapter 270, Section 36) is amended to read: 17 "7-9-117. DEDUCTION--GROSS RECEIPTS--GOVERNMENTAL GROSS 18 RECEIPTS--MARKETPLACE SELLER.--19 20 Α. A marketplace seller may deduct receipts for sales, leases and licenses of tangible personal property, 21 sales of licenses and sales of services or licenses for use 22 of real property that are facilitated by a marketplace 23 provider from gross receipts and governmental gross receipts; 24 provided that the marketplace seller obtains documentation 25

from the marketplace provider indicating that the marketplace 2 provider is registered with the department and has remitted 3 or will remit the taxes due on the gross receipts from those transactions. 4

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5 Β. The deduction provided by this section shall 6 not apply if the marketplace provider is determined not to owe the tax due to the marketplace provider's reliance on 7 8 information provided by the seller as determined pursuant to Subsection C of Section 7-9-5 NMSA 1978." 9

10 SECTION 7. Section 7-9A-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1979, 11 Chapter 347, Section 5, as amended by Laws 1991, Chapter 159, Section 4 and also by Laws 1991, Chapter 162, Section 4) is 12 amended to read: 13

"7-9A-5. INVESTMENT CREDIT--AMOUNT--CLAIMANT.--

15 Α. The investment credit provided for in the 16 Investment Credit Act may be claimed by a taxpayer carrying 17 on a manufacturing operation in New Mexico in an amount equal to: 18

the product of the sum of the 19 (1) 20 compensating tax rate and, beginning July 1, 2021, any municipal or county compensating tax rate multiplied by the 21 value of the qualified equipment; or 22

if the sale is subject to the gross (2) 23 receipts tax, the product of the sum of the gross receipts 24 tax rate and, beginning July 1, 2021, any municipal or county HB 326/a 25

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local option gross receipts tax rates multiplied by the
 seller's gross receipts from the sale of the qualified
 equipment.

B. If the purchase or the introduction into New Mexico of the qualified equipment is not subject to the gross receipts tax or compensating tax, the rate to determine the amount of the credit shall be equal to a rate of five and one-eighth percent."

SECTION 8. Section 7-9A-7 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1979, Chapter 347, Section 7, as amended) is amended to read:

"7-9A-7. VALUE OF QUALIFIED EQUIPMENT.--Prior to July 1, 2030, the value of qualified equipment shall be the adjusted basis established for the equipment under the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986."

SECTION 9. Section 7-9A-7.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983, Chapter 206, Section 6, as amended) is amended to read:

"7-9A-7.1. EMPLOYMENT REQUIREMENTS.--

A. Prior to July 1, 2030, to be eligible to claim a credit pursuant to the Investment Credit Act, the taxpayer shall employ the equivalent of one full-time employee who has not been counted to meet this employment requirement for any prior claim in addition to the number of full-time employees employed on the day one year prior to the day on which the taxpayer applies for the credit for every:

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(1) seven hundred fifty thousand dollars

(\$750,000), or portion of that amount, in value of qualified equipment claimed by the taxpayer in a taxable year in the same claim, up to a value of thirty million dollars (\$30,000,000); and

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(2) one million dollars (\$1,000,000), or portion of that amount, in value of qualified equipment over thirty million dollars (\$30,000,000) claimed by the taxpayer in a taxable year in the same claim.

9 Β. The department may require evidence showing 10 compliance with this section. The department may find that an additional employee meets the requirements of this section, 11 although employed earlier than one year prior to the day on 12 which the taxpayer applies for the credit, if the employee 13 was only being trained prior to that date or the employee's 14 15 employment was necessitated by the use of the qualified equipment." 16

SECTION 10. Section 7-9A-8 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1979, Chapter 347, Section 8, as amended) is amended to read:

"7-9A-8. CLAIMING THE CREDIT FOR CERTAIN TAXES.--

A. A taxpayer shall apply for approval for a credit within one year following the end of the calendar year in which the qualified equipment for the manufacturing operation is purchased or introduced into New Mexico.

B. A taxpayer having applied for and been grantedapproval for a credit by the department pursuant to the

1 Investment Credit Act may claim an amount of available credit 2 against the taxpayer's tax liabilities; provided that the 3 credit shall be claimed against the taxpayer's tax liabilities pursuant to the Gross Receipts and Compensating 4 5 Tax Act, the Municipal Local Option Gross Receipts and 6 Compensating Taxes Act and the County Local Option Gross Receipts and Compensating Taxes Act before being claimed 7 8 against the taxpayer's tax liabilities pursuant to the 9 Withholding Tax Act; provided further that no taxpayer may 10 claim, except as provided in Subsection C of this section, an 11 amount of available credit for any reporting period that exceeds eighty-five percent of the sum of the taxpayer's tax 12 liabilities for that reporting period. Any amount of 13 available credit not claimed against the taxpayer's tax 14 15 liabilities for a reporting period may be claimed in subsequent reporting periods. 16

17 C. A taxpayer may apply by September 30 of the 18 current calendar year for a refund of the unclaimed balance 19 of the available credit up to a maximum of two hundred fifty 20 thousand dollars (\$250,000) if on January 1 of the current 21 calendar year:

(1) the taxpayer's available credit is lessthan five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000); and

(2) the sum of the taxpayer's tax liabilities for the previous calendar year was less than

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thirty-five percent of the taxpayer's available credit but more than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).

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D. As used in this section, "tax liabilities" means any tax liability a taxpayer incurs pursuant to the Withholding Tax Act, the Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax Act, the Municipal Local Option Gross Receipts and Compensating Taxes Act or the County Local Option Gross Receipts and Compensating Taxes Act."

9 SECTION 11. Section 7-19D-9 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1978,
10 Chapter 151, Section 1, as amended) is amended to read:

"7-19D-9. MUNICIPAL GROSS RECEIPTS TAX--AUTHORITY TO IMPOSE RATE.--

The majority of the members of the governing 13 Α. body of any municipality may impose by ordinance an excise 14 15 tax on the gross receipts of any person engaging in business 16 in the municipality for the privilege of engaging in business in the municipality. A tax imposed pursuant to this section 17 shall be imposed by the enactment of one or more ordinances 18 enacting any number of increments of one-hundredth percent; 19 20 provided that the total increments do not exceed the maximum rate provided in Subsection C of this section; and provided 21 further that, if at the time of enacting the ordinance the 22 total municipal gross receipts tax rate is not an even 23 multiple of one-hundredth percent, the municipality may 24 impose an increment in an amount sufficient to bring the 25

total rate to an even multiple of one-hundredth percent. The 2 governing body of a municipality may, at the time of enacting 3 the ordinance, dedicate the revenue for any municipal purpose. If the governing body proposes to dedicate such 4 5 revenue, the ordinance and, if any election is held, the 6 ballot shall clearly state the purpose to which the revenue will be dedicated, and any revenue so dedicated shall be used 7 by the municipality for that purpose unless a subsequent 8 ordinance is adopted to change the purpose to which dedicated 9 10 or to place the revenue in the general fund of the municipality. 11

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The tax imposed pursuant to Subsection A of 12 Β. this section may be referred to as the "municipal gross 13 receipts tax". 14

15 C. The maximum rate of the municipal gross 16 receipts tax on the gross receipts of any person engaging in business in the municipality shall not exceed two and one-17 half percent. Of that two and one-half percent: 18

a governing body may choose to require 19 (1) 20 an election to impose increments up to a total of two and five-hundredths percent; and 21

(2) the remaining increments, up to a total 22 of forty-five hundredths percent, shall not go into effect 23 until after an election is held and a majority of the voters 24 in the municipality voting in the election votes in favor of 25

the tax. Increments approved by voters prior to July 1, 2019 shall be included in the increments approved by the voters, as provided in this paragraph.

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D. An election shall be called on the questions of disapproval or approval of any ordinance enacted pursuant to Subsection C of this section or any ordinance amending such ordinance:

8 (1) if the governing body chooses to provide
9 in the ordinance that it shall not be effective until the
10 ordinance is approved by the majority of the registered
11 voters voting on the question at an election to be held
12 pursuant to the provisions of the Local Election Act; or

13 (2) if the ordinance does not contain a 14 mandatory election provision as provided in Paragraph (1) of 15 this subsection, upon the filing of a petition requesting 16 such an election if the petition is filed:

17 (a) pursuant to the requirements of a
18 referendum provision contained in a municipal home-rule
19 charter and signed by the number of registered voters in the
20 municipality equal to the number of registered voters
21 required in its charter to seek a referendum; or

(b) in all other municipalities, with the municipal clerk within thirty days after the adoption of such ordinance and the petition has been signed by a number of registered voters in the municipality equal to at least

five percent of the number of the voters in the municipality who were registered to vote in the most recent regular municipal election.

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The signatures on the petition filed in 4 Ε. 5 accordance with Subsection D of this section shall be 6 verified by the municipal clerk. If the petition is verified by the municipal clerk as containing the required number of 7 signatures of registered voters, the governing body shall 8 adopt an election resolution calling for the holding of a 9 10 special election on the question of approving or disapproving the ordinance unless the ordinance is repealed before the 11 adoption of the election resolution. An election held 12 pursuant to Subparagraph (a) or (b) of Paragraph (2) of 13 Subsection D of this section shall be called, conducted and 14 15 canvassed as provided in the Local Election Act, and the election shall be held within seventy-five days after the 16 date the petition is verified by the municipal clerk or it 17 may be held in conjunction with a regular local election if 18 such election occurs within seventy-five days after the date 19 20 of verification by the municipal clerk.

F. If at an election called pursuant to Subsection D of this section a majority of the registered voters voting on the question approves the ordinance imposing the tax, the ordinance shall become effective in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Local Option Gross Receipts and

Compensating Taxes Act. If at such an election a majority of the registered voters voting on the question disapproves the ordinance, the ordinance imposing the tax shall be deemed repealed and the question of imposing any increment of the municipal gross receipts tax authorized in this section shall not be considered again by the governing body for a period of one year from the date of the election.

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8 G. Any law that imposes or authorizes the 9 imposition of a municipal gross receipts tax or that affects 10 the municipal gross receipts tax, or any law supplemental 11 thereto or otherwise appertaining thereto, shall not be repealed or amended or otherwise directly or indirectly 12 modified in such a manner as to impair adversely any 13 outstanding revenue bonds that may be secured by a pledge of 14 15 such municipal gross receipts tax unless such outstanding revenue bonds have been discharged in full or provision has 16 been fully made therefor." 17

18 SECTION 12. Section 7-20E-9 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983,
19 Chapter 213, Section 30, as amended) is amended to read:

20 "7-20E-9. COUNTY GROSS RECEIPTS TAX--AUTHORITY TO
 21 IMPOSE RATE--COUNTY HEALTH CARE ASSISTANCE FUND
 22 REQUIREMENTS.--

A. A majority of the members of the governing body
 of a county may impose by ordinance an excise tax on the
 gross receipts of a person engaging in business in the county HB 326/a Page 27

1 or the county area. A tax imposed pursuant to this section 2 shall be imposed by the enactment of one or more ordinances 3 enacting any number of increments of one-hundredth percent; provided that the total increments do not exceed the maximum 4 5 rate provided in Subsections C and D of this section; and provided further that, if at the time of enacting the 6 ordinance the total county gross receipts tax rate is not an 7 even multiple of one-hundredth percent, the county may impose 8 an increment in an amount sufficient to bring the total rate 9 to an even multiple of one-hundredth percent. The governing 10 body may, at the time of enacting the ordinance, dedicate the 11 revenue for any county purpose. 12

B. The tax authorized by this section is to bereferred to as the "county gross receipts tax".

C. The maximum rate of the county gross receipts tax that may be imposed on the gross receipts of any person engaging in business in a county shall not exceed one and twenty-five hundredths percent. Of that one and twenty-five hundredths percent:

20 (1) a governing body may choose to require 21 an election to impose increments up to a total of one 22 percent; and

(2) the remaining increments, up to a total
of twenty-five hundredths percent, shall not go into effect
until after an election is held and a majority of the voters

in the county voting in the election votes in favor of the tax. Increments approved by voters prior to July 1, 2019 shall be included in the increments approved by the voters, as provided in this paragraph.

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5 D. In addition to the maximum rate that may be 6 imposed on the gross receipts of any person engaging in 7 business in a county, the maximum rate of the county gross 8 receipts tax that may be imposed on the gross receipts of any 9 person engaging in business in a county area shall not exceed 10 one-half percent. Of that one-half percent:

(1) a governing body may choose to require an election to impose increments that total twelve hundredths percent; but

(2) the remaining increments, up to a total 14 15 of thirty-eight hundredths percent, shall not go into effect until after an election is held and a majority of the voters 16 in the county area voting in the election votes in favor of 17 Increments approved by voters prior to July 1, 2019 the tax. 18 shall be included in the increments approved by the voters, 19 20 as provided in this paragraph.

E. A class A county with a county hospital
operated and maintained pursuant to a lease or operating
agreement with a state educational institution named in
Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico
shall provide not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) HB 326/a

in funds, and that amount shall be dedicated to the support of indigent patients who are residents of that county. Funds for indigent care shall be made available each month of each year the tax is in effect in an amount not less than eightythree thousand three hundred thirty-three dollars thirtythree cents (\$83,333.33). The interest from the investment of county funds for indigent care may be used for other assistance to indigent persons, not to exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for all other assistance in any year.

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F. A county, except a class A county with a county 10 hospital operated and maintained pursuant to a lease or 11 operating agreement with a state educational institution 12 named in Article 12, Section 11 of the constitution of New 13 Mexico, shall be required to dedicate revenue produced by the 14 15 imposition of a one-eighth percent gross receipts tax increment for the support of indigent patients who are 16 residents of that county. A county that imposed up to two 17 one-eighth percent increments on January 1, 1996 for support 18 of indigent patients in the county or, after January 1, 1996, 19 20 imposes a one-eighth percent increment and dedicates one-half of that increment for county indigent patient purposes shall 21 deposit the revenue dedicated for county indigent purposes 22 that is transferred to the county in the county health care 23 assistance fund, and such revenues shall be expended pursuant 24 to the Indigent Hospital and County Health Care Act." 25

1 SECTION 13. TEMPORARY PROVISION--ORDINANCES IMPOSING 2 CERTAIN REPEALED LOCAL OPTION GROSS RECEIPTS TAXES DEEMED TO 3 BE IMPOSING AN EQUAL RATE OF THE MUNICIPAL OR COUNTY GROSS RECEIPTS TAX.--An ordinance imposing a local option gross 4 5 receipts tax authorized by those sections of law that were 6 repealed and consolidated with the municipal gross receipts 7 tax or the county gross receipts tax by Laws 2019, Chapter 8 274 is deemed to be imposing an equal rate of the municipal 9 gross receipts tax or county gross receipts tax, as 10 appropriate, as was imposed by the ordinance when the 11 ordinance was enacted; provided that the ordinance was in effect on the date of repeal and the ordinance has not been 12 13 repealed by the governing body. Any dedication of revenue pursuant to the ordinance remains in effect until changed by 14 15 the governing body; provided that, if the dedication were 16 approved by the electorate, any change to the dedication must 17 also be approved by the electorate.

SECTION 14. REPEAL.--Sections 7-9-57.1 and 7-9-96 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1998, Chapter 92, Section 3 and Laws 2005, Chapter 104, Section 26) are repealed effective July 1, 2020.

SECTION 15. REPEAL.--Laws 2019, Chapter 270, Section 11 is repealed.

SECTION 16. APPLICABILITY.--

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A. The provisions of Section 3 of this act apply to taxable years beginning on and after January 1, 2020. HB 326/a
