11	REQUESTING THE SECRETARY OF HUMAN SERVICES TO CONVENE A TASK
12	FORCE TO ASSESS DATA AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO ADDRESS
13	BARRIERS TO FOOD ACCESS.

15	WHEREAS, the United States department of agriculture
16	research service ranks New Mexico as a state with one of the
17	highest rates of people experiencing hunger; and
18	WHEREAS, the department of health reported that three
19	hundred twenty-six thousand New Mexicans experienced food
20	insecurity in 2017; and
21	WHEREAS, one of every four children in New Mexico faces
22	hunger due to food insecurity; and
23	WHEREAS, New Mexico leads the nation in childhood hunger;
24	and
25	WHEREAS, rural residents face significant levels of
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1 poverty; and

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2 WHEREAS, the United States department of agriculture
3 reported that individuals living outside of metropolitan areas
4 experienced higher rates of food insecurity; and

WHEREAS, the United States department of agriculture recognized that low-income communities with constrained resources faced barriers in access to food; and

WHEREAS, lack of transportation infrastructure for food distribution contributes to food insecurity and hunger; and

WHEREAS, the United States department of agriculture recognized that distance from stores that sell fresh foods can contribute to these barriers; and

WHEREAS, individuals facing hunger and food insecurity are less likely to use personal transportation than those who are food secure; and

WHEREAS, New Mexico food banks respond to emergency food needs for people experiencing food insecurity and hunger and are core to all efforts to address hunger and malnutrition; and

WHEREAS, New Mexico food banks collect important data about food insecurity, hunger and malnutrition that could aid in decision making and problem solving; and

WHEREAS, agriculture is vital to New Mexico's economy and culture; and

WHEREAS, over ninety percent of food New Mexicans consume comes from out of state, and nearly all food produced in New .216162.4

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1 Mexico leaves the state; and

2 WHEREAS, gaps in the agricultural supply chain and distribution infrastructure affect the ability of New Mexicans 3 to obtain sufficient and healthy food; and 4 WHEREAS, New Mexico could rely on state farmers and 5 ranchers for needed food, which would further benefit the 6 7 state's economy, environment and access to nutritious food; and 8 WHEREAS, a stronger local food system keeps more dollars 9 in local communities and helps combat food insecurity and 10 hunger; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF 11 12 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the secretary of human services be requested to convene a task force to study 13 and assess hunger, malnutrition, food production and 14 distribution; assess existing data; and identify the state's 15 barriers to ensuring that all New Mexicans have access to a 16 nutritious and sufficient diet; and 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be composed of 18 19 representatives from: 20 Α. the human services department; the department of health; Β. 21 C. the aging and long-term services department; 22 D. the New Mexico department of agriculture; 23 the children, youth and families department; Ε. 24 the university of New Mexico; F. 25

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1	G. New Mexico state university;
2	H. the New Mexico state university agricultural
3	experiment station;
4	I. the office of the governor;
5	J. the Indian affairs department;
6	K. the New Mexico association of food banks;
7	L. the public education department;
8	M. food, hunger and nonprofit organizations; and
9	N. the higher education department; and
10	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be requested to
11	examine the best available data and assess:
12	A. the incidence of hunger and malnutrition;
13	B. causes and ramifications of hunger and
14	malnutrition;
15	C. public awareness of the characteristics of a
16	healthy and nutritious diet and the consequences of maintaining
17	an unhealthy diet;
18	D. publicly funded meal programs, including those
19	provided in schools, senior centers and facilities and
20	intergenerational summer meal programs;
21	E. the ability of residents to access and purchase
22	healthy and nutritious foods;
23	F. food production and agriculture in New Mexico;
24	G. infrastructure for food produced in New Mexico;
25	H. transportation and distribution of food products
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1 to processors and markets; the distance of food retailers from households 2 I. 3 relative to where the population lives; the ability of households, emergency food 4 J. providers and agricultural producers to safely store perishable 5 food: and 6 7 Κ. public and private nutrition assistance programs; and 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that through identifying and 9 analyzing the best available data, the task force be requested 10 to identify: 11 12 Α. the scope, causes and ramifications of hunger and malnutrition in New Mexico; 13 14 Β. policies and programs addressing hunger that could be improved; 15 policies and programs that address and provide C. 16 bracketed material] = delete recommendations for intergenerational meal programs; 17 charitable efforts that may assist in addressing D. 18 19 hunger; 20 Ε. ways to strengthen the relationships between New Mexico food production, food retail and publicly funded meal 21 programs; 22 F. methods of improving statewide infrastructure to 23 address these interrelated problems; and 24 G. methods of improving data- and information-25 .216162.4 - 5 -

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sharing systems across industries and sectors that collect food, hunger, malnutrition and agriculture data to facilitate monitoring, analysis and problem solving to strengthen local food systems and reduce hunger and malnutrition; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be requested to report its findings and recommendations to the office of the governor and the legislative health and human services committee by November 1, 2020; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the governor, the secretary of human services and the chair of the legislative health and human services committee.

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
