7	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
8	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLEThis act may be cited as the
9	"Environmental Database Act".
10	SECTION 2. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Environmental
11	Database Act:
12	A. "environmental data" means geospatial data
13	relating to the environmental resources in the state
14	specified in Paragraphs (1) through (8) of Subsection D of
15	Section 3 of the Environmental Database Act;
16	B. "environmental database" means the centralized,
17	map-based, searchable website created pursuant to the
18	Environmental Database Act that houses the state's
19	environmental data;
20	C. "host" means the natural heritage New Mexico
21	division of the museum of southwestern biology at the
22	university of New Mexico; and
23	D. "state agency" means the energy, minerals and
24	natural resources department, the department of environment,
25	the state land office, the department of health, the

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SECTION 3. ENVIRONMENTAL DATABASE--ENVIRONMENTAL DATA
REQUIRED--HOST AND STATE AGENCY DUTIES.--

- A. The host, with the cooperation of the state agencies, shall improve the state's environmental data infrastructure by creating, operating and maintaining the environmental database, which shall be user-friendly, searchable and accessible to the public and state agencies and its primary services free of charge. The environmental database shall house the state's environmental data for the purpose of governmental transparency, interagency cooperation and information sharing and to provide widespread access to the best scientific data to address the state's natural resource and environmental management needs.
- B. No later than December 31, 2021, the host shall establish an information exchange process for the collection and electronic publication of the state's environmental data.
- C. No later than July 1, 2022, the environmental database shall be available for public access and include the environmental data specified in Subsection D of this section, subject to the confidentiality provisions of Section 4 of the Environmental Database Act.

2	E. A state agency shall provide the host with
3	updates to the state agency's environmental data as
4	frequently as possible, but at least annually.
5	F. The host shall update the environmental
6	database as new data is received, but at least annually.
7	SECTION 4. PROTECTION OF CONFIDENTIAL
8	INFORMATIONNothing in the Environmental Database Act shall
9	require disclosure by a state agency of:
10	A. information that is confidential by state or
11	federal law;
12	B. sensitive biological information that cannot be
13	made publicly available for the protection of species;
14	C. information required to remain confidential for
15	safety or security reasons;
16	D. archaeological or cultural survey information,
17	unless the information is already publicly available or, if
18	the information is of cultural significance to an Indian
19	nation, tribe or pueblo, the disclosure is done with
20	permission from the relevant Indian nation, tribe or pueblo;

22	E. information that is not already provided to a
23	state agency pursuant to rule or law HB 51/a
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
