A MEMORIAL

REQUESTING THE NEW MEXICO DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE TO STUDY THE ECONOMIC BENEFITS OF REGIONAL MOBILE LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTER UNITS TO MAKE IT EASIER FOR SMALL RANCHERS TO HAVE THEIR LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTERED, CUT AND WRAPPED FOR PERSONAL USE OR 6 INTRASTATE SALE.

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8 WHEREAS, in 2006, the Taos county economic development 9 corporation received five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) 10 from the New Mexico legislature to establish, equip and 11 operate New Mexico's first mobile livestock slaughter unit, 12 which operated until its closure in 2018 due to a lack of 13 operational funding; and

14 WHEREAS, the mobile livestock slaughter unit was 15 initiated to assist northern New Mexico livestock producers 16 who were contending with high livestock slaughter costs and 17 the absence of in-state commercial livestock slaughter 18 facilities with cut and wrap features; and

19 WHEREAS, the New Mexico livestock board no longer 20 provides meat inspection, which puts small livestock 21 producers at a significant disadvantage; and

22 WHEREAS, New Mexico livestock producers must transport 23 their animals out-of-state to commercial livestock slaughter 24 facilities with cut and wrap services in Texas, Colorado and 25 Arizona, which can be a prohibitive expense for many

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WHEREAS, the Taos county mobile livestock slaughter unit demonstrated the need for state support for a low-cost, efficient alternative to shipping livestock out of state to United States department of agriculture-certified facilities for slaughter, cut and wrap; and

WHEREAS, the agriculture industry and livestock 8 production generate over three billion dollars (\$3,000,000,000) annually; and 9

WHEREAS, the loss of oil and gas tax revenue and jobs 10 points to the critical need for economic diversification, and 11 the establishment of regional mobile livestock slaughter 12 units will aid farmers and ranchers in growing their share of 13 the state's economy as well as contributing tax revenue to 14 15 rural local governments and the state and providing the state's residents with access to locally sourced food; and 16

WHEREAS, national and international food systems and food production have been negatively affected by the coronavirus disease 2019 crisis and this has increased dependence on more localized food systems and food production; and

WHEREAS, livestock producers and farmers' markets, food 22 system collaboratives and other farm-to-table advocates 23 continue to express demand for mobile livestock slaughter 24 services in New Mexico; and 25

HM 1 Page 2 WHEREAS, there are questions about how to structure, support and deliver mobile livestock slaughter services to revive this much-needed service and offer it statewide through regionalization;

5 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF 6 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the New Mexico department of agriculture, with the assistance of the 7 New Mexico livestock board and the New Mexico farm and ranch 8 resource center at New Mexico state university, be requested 9 10 to conduct a comprehensive study of the feasibility of a statewide, regionally structured state-supported system to 11 provide mobile livestock slaughter services to support the 12 livestock industry, local economies and residents of the 13 state; and 14

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study include a survey of small livestock producers as to the utility of regional mobile livestock slaughter services and consult the 2007-2016 production reports and data collected by the Taos county economic development corporation on the operation of its mobile livestock slaughter unit and the 2018 topical study by the Thornburg foundation; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study also include:

A. a description of a model mobile livestock
slaughter, cut and wrap system, including meat inspection for
intrastate sales;

HM 1 Page 3 B. based on the livestock producers survey, recommendations on the number and location of mobile livestock slaughter unit regions and, if feasible, opportunities for co-housing with the cooperative extension service or other agricultural-related offices in those regions;

7 C. recommendations on the best organizational 8 structure for the mobile livestock slaughter units, including 9 oversight and administrative attachment responsibilities of a 10 state agency such as the New Mexico department of 11 agriculture, the New Mexico livestock board or another state 12 agency or institution;

D. best practices for regional management andoperations; and

E. estimates of start-up costs and monthly and annual capital and production costs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the New Mexico department of agriculture submit its report to the interim committee that is concerned with economic and rural development issues by December 1, 2021; and

21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be 22 transmitted to the board of regents of New Mexico state 23 university, the New Mexico department of agriculture and the 24 New Mexico livestock board.

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
