14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
15	SECTION 1. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] FINDINGSThe legislature
16	finds that:
17	A. the state of New Mexico is entirely situated
18	within one federally established time zone;
19	B. the federal Uniform Time Act of 1966, Public Law
20	89-387, provides for the advancement of standard time by one
21	hour during a portion of each year, a period commonly known as
22	"daylight saving time"; and
23	C. federal law permits a state that is entirely
24	situated within one time zone to exempt itself by law from the
25	requirement to advance time for daylight saving; provided that

SECTION 2. [NEW MATERIAL] MOUNTAIN STANDARD TIME--NO ADVANCEMENT FOR DAYLIGHT SAVING .-- Effective January 1, 2024, the entire state of New Mexico shall: be exempted from federal law that requires Α. advancing time for daylight saving; and Β. throughout the year observe mountain standard time without the advancement of time for daylight saving. - 2 -.223629.1
