SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

This bill creates a new felony crime of organized residential theft and establishes penalties based on the cumulative value of property stolen within a 365-day period.

As defined in the bill, organized residential theft consists of acting in concert with one or more persons to steal personal property from more than one residence or from a single residence on two or more occasions. The degrees of the crime and penalties are as follows:

- Fourth degree felony when the value of the stolen property is more than \$500 but not more than \$2500
- Third degree felony when the value is more than \$2500 but not more than \$20,000
- Second degree felony when the value is more than \$20,000.

The bill defines "personal property" as chattel of any type or description, including letters, packages or parcels distributed by mail or other means. "Residence" includes a dwelling, the curtilage of a dwelling (area of land immediately surrounding a house and enclosed with it, including auxiliary structures), and shared spaces in a multifamily dwelling.

For anyone charged with the crime of organized residential theft, section C of the bill precludes charging that individual with additional or separate offenses arising under the same action or occurrence.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

No fiscal implications to DPS.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

<u>Charging Limitation</u>: The charging limitation as outlined in Section C could impact how residential crime is investigated and prosecuted within the state and federal systems, including but not limited to aggravated burglary and possession of a firearm by restricted individuals (felons, minors, etcetera).

<u>Use of "Including" in Definitions</u>: In *State v. Strauch*, the New Mexico Supreme Court held that, with respect to legislative drafting, the use of "including" in statute is a non-exhaustive list. In other words, when statutes use "including" the list of things that follow fall within the definition,

but so do all the things that are unlisted. In this case, personal property would include both letters, packages, or parcels, but also any other chattels of any type or description. Thus, if the intent is for personal property to only be letters, packages, and parcels, the definition should be amended to align with the case law in *Strauch*.
