SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: This bill would allow eligible persons over 18 to carry a gun without any condition or permit/licensing prerequisites, and would repeal NMSA 30-7.2.2 thru 30-7-3 which impose some limitations to carrying a firearm in public.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Because this bill would repeal a misdemeanor and felony-level crime, the proposed legislation might actually reducing the prosecution of certain possession-only crimes. Any such reduction, however, would be nominal, as these regulatory crimes are rarely charged. Meanwhile, by allowing and encouraging concealed carry, the proposed legislation could lead to greater use of firearms during disputes if the firearms are at the ready, which could lead to an increase in charges of felonies involving the use and not just possession of a firearm. The fiscal impact on LOPD is impossible to estimate at this time.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Currently, it is unlawful for a person under 19 to carry a firearm, except in certain enumerated circumstances. See NMSA 1978, § 30-7-2.2 (open carry is permitted at age 19, unless not permitted by other state or federal laws). Concealed carry licensing is available but there is an application process and a minimum age requirement of 21. See NMSA 1978, § 29-19-4. This bill doesn't seem to impact the requirements currently in place for acquiring a concealed carry permit.

To the extent that the bill would prevent selective enforcement, our clients may benefit. Indigent, black and Latinx people are disproportionately charged with firearm possession crimes. Although HB 78 still creates a petty misdemeanor for unlawfully carrying a firearm, the simultaneous repealing of 30-7-2.2 through 30-7-3 would decriminalize some conduct. Currently, violation of 30-7-2.2 is currently a misdemeanor (unlawful possession of a handgun under age 19), 30-7-2.4 is a petty misdemeanor (carrying on university premises); 30-7-3 is a fourth-degree felony (carrying in a liquor establishment).

As noted in the Fiscal Implications, increasing the number of people who are carrying concealed firearms is likely to result in an increase in gun violence. Any increase in charges of felonies involving the use and not just possession of a firearm would likely have a disparate impact on communities of color.
