- There are barriers in data sharing. There is an inherent distrust when it comes to data sharing. The use of a tribal liaison who is aware of the barriers when requesting data from sovereign entities.

- The inclusion of the tribal specific local health councils when planning, there have been disparities in inclusion when requesting participation from local health councils.
- Engagement of Tribal Elder program/Tribal Elder Affairs when determining the needs of Elders within communities.
