# **BILL SUMMARY**

This bill adds to the firearm sales section of Article 7 of the Criminal Code requiring a 14-business day waiting period for sale and transfer of a firearm to a buyer. During the waiting period, a federal instant background check shall be completed. The sole exception carved out in the bill is for sales to immediate family members within three degrees of consanguinity.

If passed, the bill would make a violation of the waiting period or the failure to complete an instant background check punishable as a misdemeanor penalty.

During the waiting period, the firearm shall remain with the seller and upon a premature transfer, each party involved may be separately charged and separately liable for the violation, and additionally, if more than one, the transfer of each firearm contrary to the bill is considered a separate criminal offense. The bill provides that two or more offenses may be charged in the same charging document but shall be punished separately.

In addition, the bill requires that the records of firearm sales by the seller be made available upon the request of a law enforcement agency.

- On page 2, line 24, after "misdemeanor," insert "and shall be sentenced in accordance with the provisions of Section 31-19-1 NMSA 1978."
- On page 3, lines 4-5 "immediate family members to the third degree of consanguinity" is contradictory. Immediate family is a person's smallest family unit, including parents, siblings, spouse, and children. The third level on consanguinity includes relationships outside the smallest unit of family such as great-grandparents and great-grandchildren. Which is this meant to apply to?
