SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis</u>: House Bill 168 would amend Section 30-7-16(A) NMSA 1978 be creating a new category of person prohibited from receiving, transporting or possessing a firearm or destructive device in New Mexico to include "an undocumented person". This legislation also amends Section 30-7-16(D) NMSA 1978 to include "an undocumented person" as being subject to a full misdemeanor penalty if found guilty of receiving, transporting or possessing a firearm or destructive device.

HB 168 defines "an undocumented person" as an individual not legally present in the United States at the time of receiving, transporting or possessing a firearm or destructive device.

HB 168 does not contain an effective date and would be effective on May 15, 2024, 90 days following adjournment of the Legislature, if signed into law.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The fiscal impact of this new offense would be proportional to the number of prosecutions that commence. More trials and more jury trials will require additional judge time, courtroom staff time, courtroom availability and jury expenses.

There will be a minimal administrative cost for statewide update, distribution and documentation of statutory changes. Any additional fiscal impact on the judiciary would be proportional to the enforcement of this law and commenced prosecutions. New laws, amendments to existing laws and new hearings have the potential to increase caseloads in the courts, thus requiring additional resources to handle the increase.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The definition of "an undocumented person" may be overly vague and could lead to issues in prosecuting this new crime. HB 168 does not mention whether the person must know that they are not legally authorized to be or remain in the United States at the time they were found with a firearm or destructive devices. A person may legally enter the United States with student visa but can become undocumented if they do not fulfill the minimum course of study requirement.
