SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

HB 234 creates a "medical malpractice premium assistance fund" and appropriates \$70,000,000 to the Office of Superintendent of Insurance (OSI) to develop and administer a program to provide medical malpractice premium assistance beginning in FY 25.

Section 2 specifies this is a non-recurring appropriation that can only be used for premium assistance, not operations.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The bill limits the use of the funds for the assistance to healthcare providers for medical malpractice premiums.

The bill does not provide funds to OSI for the establishment and administration of the program, or any staff to take on these roles. As such, without a corresponding increase in funding and staffing, OSI would be tasked with distributing a significant amount of funding without the necessary resources for program development, an eligibility determination platform, or additional staff/contractors to process payments and monitor fraudulent claims.

1) SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

No recurring funding source is created. Failure to provide future appropriations will result in the amount of or the inability to provide future premiums assistance.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

The OSI will need additional funding and staff to develop and administer the program.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

The OSI does not have the existing infrastructure to develop and administer this program. The OSI will require additional funding and staff to develop and implement the program.

OTHER SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES

The legislation is silent on whether a provider who participate in the Patient Compensation Fund (PCF) is eligible for premium assistance.

ALTERNATIVES

OSI has requested over \$35 million to reduce the deficit surcharge on independent health care providers and facilities.

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

Medical malpractice premium assistance provided by this bill will not be available.

AMENDMENTS

The OSI recommends amendments that:

- 1) Provide an operational appropriation to the OSI for the development and administration of the program; and
 - 2) Clarify whether a provider participating in the Patient Compensation Fund (PCF) is eligible for premium assistance.
