BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> HB 310 amends Section 61-37-19 NMSA 1978 to add administrative penalties for employees that knowingly sell tobacco products to a minor as follows:

- A penalty not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation; and
- A penalty not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) for a subsequent violation.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There will be a minimal administrative cost for statewide update, distribution and documentation of statutory changes. Any additional fiscal impact on the judiciary would be proportional to the enforcement of this law and commenced prosecutions, and appeals from convictions. New laws, amendments to existing laws and new hearings have the potential to increase caseloads in the courts, thus requiring additional resources to handle the increase.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Tobacco use by youth in the United States remains a high public health concern. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General (OIG) recently released a report based on data from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regarding inspections of tobacco retailers conducted between 2010 and 2019. In those ten years, nearly 74% of tobacco retailers in business nationwide as of 2020 were inspected to determine whether the retailers were in violation of tobacco law or regulation. The inspections were conducted through the FDA's Tobacco Retailer Compliance Check Inspection Program. The report cites this program as a critical part of the FDA's approach to prevent youth access to tobacco. In New Mexico, 90% of the 1,314 retailers in business as of 2020 were inspected. The report does not provide specific findings by state, but during the ten year inspection period, the FDA cited violations in 10% of inspections. As a result of these violations, the FDA issued 93,813 warning letters, which accounts for 79% of the actions taken by the FDA. A total of 24,708 Civil Money Penalties (CMPs) were assessed for retailers that were found to have additional violations after receiving a warning letter. The CMPs accounted for 21% of the FDA actions. The FDA also issued 204 notobacco-sale orders (NTSOs) for retailers with 5 or more repeated violations within 36 months.
