BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> Declares January 25, 2024, as New Mexico Food and Farms Day in the House of Representatives in celebration of community food and farm initiatives toward ending hunger and strengthening the statewide food system.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

None currently identified.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

- The older adult and senior population of New Mexico continues to grow. It is anticipated that by 2030, New Mexico will be the 4th highest in the nation for total senior population per capita (University of New Mexico, Geospatial and Population Studies).
- In New Mexico, 5.9% (29,383) of adults aged sixty (60) and older are food insecure (Feeding America. 2023. The State of Senior Hunger in America in 2021: An Annual Report).
- 49,755 of New Mexicans aged 50–59 years were either food insecure or had very low food security (Feeding America. 2023. The State of Senior Hunger in America in 2021: An Annual Report).
- The most recent data show 54,028 (14%) of New Mexico households with at least one person aged 60 or older received food stamps and or Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in the past 12 months (U.S. Census Bureau, 2022 American Community Survey 1-Year Estimates; table B22001).
- Senior hunger impacts older adults in both rural and urban environments. However, research from Feeding America found people who live in rural areas face relatively higher hunger rates due to the unique challenges associated with living in remote areas; these challenges include additional barriers in food access, transportation, and proximity to food banks or grocery stores.
- During the COVID-19 pandemic, service providers and seniors reported difficulty

- accessing food in rural areas of the state. Food cost, specifically on meat and fresh produce has increased by more than 13%, therefore service providers and seniors will benefit from farmer's markets and local grown and produced food.
- Declaration of January 25, 2024, as New Mexico Food and Farms Day allows for the recognition and celebration of the local ranchers, farmers, and the Governor's Food, Farm, and Hunger Initiative. Currently, 32 entities participate in the NM Grown program resulting in 91 senior centers incorporating locally grown produce into prepared senior meals. Also, the New Mexico Grown program promotes the New Mexico Senior Olympics to work with New Mexico ranchers and farmers to provide locally grown and produced food boxes to an estimated 100 seniors statewide for annual Senior Olympics events.
