BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: Senate Bill 6 amends statutes related to cannabis regulation including changing definitions; providing powers and duties; providing procedures for criminal history background checks; removing the prohibition against a person owning both a cannabis license and a license under the liquor control act; prohibiting co-location of cannabis activities and alcoholic beverage sales or service activities to the public or members of private clubs; providing for investigatory confidentiality; providing for seizure and destruction of illegal, adulterated or misbranded cannabis products; allowing for licensee conversion from nonprofit to for-profit corporate status; changing packaging requirements; replacing licensure with registration of cannabis training and education programs; including the cannabis regulation act in the racketeering act, the delinquency act and the uniform licensing act; including cannabis in a list of contraband in jails and prisons; creating crimes; prescribing penalties; and repealing a delayed repeal; amending, repealing and enacting sections of the NMSA 1978.

The bill has an effective date of July 1, 2024.

In Section 4 of the bill, medical cannabis legacy non-profits that were required to organize as non-profits under by the Department of Health in order to qualify for a medical license may convert into for-profit corporations under the Business Corporation Act, limited liability companies under the Limited Liability Company Act, limited partnerships under the Uniform Revised Limited Partnership Act or a partnership under the Uniform Partnership Act (1994) upon the nonprofit corporation's filing with the secretary of state.

The Secretary of State's Office wishes to inform the legislature that its online business filings

system will undergo a comprehensive upgrade in the summer and fall of 2024. This upgrade represents years of planning, and its improvements will streamline the process for various filings, making it more convenient and efficient for businesses and individuals across New Mexico.

However, the implementation of this system will impact enhancements related to proposed filings contemplated in SB 6. There could not potentially be an easy way to automate the conversation process from non-profit organizations to other business types until at least January 1, 2025. In the interim, the process will be manual and will require more time than other filings.

An effective date of January 1, 2025, would help the SOS best implement the bill's provisions.
