SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> Making a transfer to the conservation legacy permanent fund for the purposes of the fund; making an appropriation.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The executive recommendation is for a \$250 million transfer allowing the Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund to spin off investment earnings in the future as the \$150M corpus requirement will be met. The minimum transfer we would expect would be \$1 million from FY25-FY28; the likely distribution will be larger in the future dependent on earnings.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

If enacted, the bill will supplement the Cultural Properties Restoration Fund, which receives \$1,000,000 annually from the Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund. The Cultural Properties Restoration Fund is administered by the Historic Preservation Division (HPD), an administrative unit of the Department of Cultural Affairs. The Fund was established in statute under the Cultural Properties Protection Act to support historic preservation projects throughout the state.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

None identified.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

Depending on the amount of funds transferred to the Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund, the Historic Preservation Division may seek a full-time FTE to manage the Cultural Properties Restoration Fund. Currently, the Fund is managed by the division's grant coordinator as a collateral duty. This person also administers a significant federal grant in addition to other duties. In 2023, the Historic Preservation Division prepared a grants manual and built a website to host all the applicable forms and instructions. The division will begin reviewing FY25 applications in mid-February.
