#### **Section IV: Narrative**

#### 1. BILL SUMMARY

a) <u>Synopsis</u>

Senate Bill 34 (SB0034) proposes to amend verbiage in section 26-1-3.2 of NMSA 1978 to streamline the definitions for eligible recipients of donated drugs into a recipient category as opposed to a list of eligible entities. It will also expand the definitions for donors of prescription drugs. It defines the timing of donated drug distribution to the patient, certain aspects of receipt of donated drugs to fall on the recipient versus the donor and eliminates restrictions on the cost of redistributing donated drugs by an eligible recipient.

This bill will ease the language for drug donation legislation and could expand the number of donors.

## b) <u>Significant Issues</u>

This bill could provide availability of prescription drugs to underinsured or uninsured folks who may not otherwise be able to purchase medications. Nearly 3 in 10 American adults who take prescription drugs say that they have skipped doses, cut pills in half, or not filled prescriptions due to cost according to President Biden in October of 2022. https://www.whitehouse.gov/briefing-room/presidential-actions/2022/10/14/executive-order-on-lowering-prescription-drug-costs-for-americans/

HB0023 from 2023 for a request for a Prescription Drug Affordability Board died.

Clients being serviced by NMDOH could use donated drugs; however, our current drug purchases are purchased as 340b products and are provided to patients even if they do not have the ability to pay.

This bill would not impact revenues since limited fees are collected for services. However, it would take time from clinical and pharmacy staff for processing and redistributing donations and distributions, although these would need to be limited to the types of medications used within the scope of practice of the recipient. Regular staff would be pulled from their normal duties and the additional cost is estimated below. Supplies for repacking would be needed, along with an appropriately licensed clinician or pharmacist to relabel such products. The majority of PHD run offices do not have a clinician on staff, so the scope would be limited.

### 8. DISPARITIES ISSUES

This bill addresses those who cannot afford prescription drugs and are willing to utilize donated product. Others may not want to utilize drugs that have been donated.

Not all eligible entities are willing to participate. NM Board of Pharmacy currently documents 23 participating clinics and 16 participating practitioners, with many of the practitioners working out of the same locations. <u>Will this work (rtsclients.com)</u>

# 9. HEALTH IMPACT(S)

Enacting this bill could benefit those who cannot afford prescription medications and are willing to utilize the same medication from drugs that have been donated to an eligible recipient.

There is no mechanism to accurately ensure drug storage for donated medication has been implemented by the donor prior to being donated.
