BILL SUMMARY

The bill proposes to amend the Racketeering Act by updating the language of the statute, incorporating "criminal gang" as an enumerated type of enterprise, and making it a first degree felony for leaders within an enterprise to finance, supervise or conspire to commit racketeering activity and a third degree felony to solicit or coerce another, including a minor, into joining or participating in racketeering activity of an enterprise.

If passed, the bill would add to the definition of racketeering the types of crimes notably engaged in by criminal enterprises, including sexual exploitation of children, criminal sexual penetration and contact, dog and cockfighting, escape from jail and penitentiary and assisting escape, bringing contraband into jail or prison, tampering with public records, impersonating a peace office, and the trafficking of humans.

Depending on successful prosecutions and sentences involving prison terms, the agency's expenses could increase with the current average annual cost per inmate at \$57,103.
