## **SECTION III: NARRATIVE**

## **BILL SUMMARY**

<u>Synopsis:</u> Senate Bill 160 (SB 160) appropriates twenty million dollars (\$20,000.0) from the General Fund to the local government division of the Department of Finance and Administration for expenditure in fiscal year 2025 and subsequent fiscal years for the City of Albuquerque to restore the Rio Grande Valley State Park.

Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of a fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund.

## FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SB 160 appropriates twenty million dollars for expenditure by the City of Albuquerque (the City) to restore the Rio Grande Valley State Park (the Park). The Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department - State Parks Division (the Division) constructed certain improvements at Rio Grande Nature Center State Park (the State Park) starting in 1981 and has leased the land beneath those facilities from the City since 1980. The lease agreement specifically states that the Division, at its sole expense, will use its best efforts to operate and maintain the State Park for the use and benefit of the citizens of the State of New Mexico and the general public.

Being that the State Park is part of the Park, the City as owner of the leased property may use funds appropriated by SB 160 within and adjacent to the State Park.

## SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The Park was established by the New Mexico State Legislature in 1983, and is managed cooperatively by the City and Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District. It is comprised of 4,300 acres extending from Sandia Pueblo in the north, through Albuquerque, and south to Isleta Pueblo. It is located on both the east and west sides of the Rio Grande. The State Park is part of the Park and highlights the habitat and conservation issues of the Rio Grande bosque. The State Park is comprised of 38 acres and sees many visitors that are on their way to the Park trail system along the river and bosque. The State Park management plan includes recommendations for partnering with the City and other agencies to cooperatively manage the Park and adjacent public lands.

The lease agreement for the State Park acknowledges the role of the Division as the "operating

party" for management of the State Park, and the City as the owner of the premises and lands adjacent to the State Park. In accordance with the roles and management functions provided by the lease, the City agrees that its activities on the premises shall be consistent with the official Open Space mission statement and purpose: "to acquire, protect, maintain, and manage significant natural landscapes and cultural resources for present and future generations. Open Space enhances the urban environment and provides wildlife habitat while offering opportunities for public enjoyment through outdoor education and low-impact recreation."

If enacted, SB 160 can support and enhance our partnership with the City to restore areas adjacent to and within the Park and State Park.

## **PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS**

Per the current lease agreement, the City and the Division are committed to seek opportunities to foster a collaborative partnership for the purpose of conducting a wide range of environmental awareness and natural resource educational programs in accordance with the State Park Management Plan; and, the City and Division intend to work closely together to ensure mutual access, teamwork, and productive communications to create an urban, natural laboratory where the public can experience the natural world and be educated in modern methods of protection, conservation, and management. The funds appropriated in SB 160 would support and enhance the Division's partnership with the City to restore areas adjacent to and within the Park and State Park.
