BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

Senate Bill 235 (SB 235) appropriates \$1 million from the general fund to the higher education department to expand current efforts through evidence-based programs to retain students and improve graduation rates at all public institutions of higher education.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SB 235 appropriates \$1 million from the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY 2025 shall revert to the general fund.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

There are barriers hampering post-secondary students being retained and graduating. The

Legislative Finance Committee performance evaluation report *Higher Education Financial Aid – Opportunity and Lottery Scholarships n*otes a 10% increase in state funding per student corresponds with increased bachelor's degrees, associate's degrees and certificates. The evaluation further states is a need to focus resources on college readiness and student success, noting increased funding for core I&G operations, particularly student supports, has a higher estimated impact on college completion than additional financial aid.

SB 235 would allow the higher education department to fund evidence based programs to assist with student retention and graduation.
