SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

This bill would create a Strategic Water Supply Program, housed in the Environment Department (NMED), that would enter into contracts with private entities to acquire and manage treated brackish water.

The bill would authorize the issuance of up to \$100 million in short-term severance tax bonds in FY25 through 27 provided that the Environment Department, with concurrence with the OSE and Indian Affairs Department (IAD) and the Economic Development Department, certifies the need for the issuance of bonds to the Board of Finance. In so certifying, NMED must demonstrate that:

- 1) the price to be paid for treated brackish water represents a fair market value as determined by a market analysis of comparable sales;
- 2) NMED will consult with the OSE, IAD, and potentially impacted Indian nations, tribes and pueblos and determine that a brackish water treatment project will not impair existing water rights or adversely impact landowners; and
- 3) a selected contractor has demonstrated technology to treat water that meets applicable standards for water quality.

The revenue from any resulting sale of treated brackish water by the state would be split 50/50 between the severance tax bonding fund and the general fund.

This bill also provides that brackish water treatment projects associated with the Strategic Water Supply Program must comply with applicable state, tribal and local governmental standards, permit requirements and other provisions of law to protect the environment and public health.

The bill would require semiannual reporting by NMED to the legislative finance committee and the appropriate legislative interim committee dealing with natural resources on the implementation of the Strategic Water Supply Program.

The bill defines "brackish water" as water sourced from a brackish water aquifer that has a dissolved solids concentration between one thousand and ten thousand milligrams per liter, and

"treated brackish water" as water that has undergone a process in which brackish water has been reconditioned by mechanical or chemical means to remove or eliminate contaminants.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The bill would enable up to \$100 million in short-term severance tax bonds to be issued or sold. Any unencumbered balance from the proceeds of these bonds shall revert to the severance tax bonding fund two years from the issuance date of the bonds.

If NMED re-sells treated brackish water that it acquires through the program, 50% of the proceeds would go to the severance tax bonding fund, and 50% of the proceeds would go to the general fund.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

SB 294 requires the Department of Environment to consult with the Office of the State Engineer to determine if water rights will be impaired by a brackish water project.

The legislation will empower the NMED to establish a program aimed at alleviating stress on water resources in a dry state grappling with substantial water supply challenges.

The OSE supports this bill, as it would create the framework for a program to spur private investment in the treatment of brackish water. In certain areas of the state, treated brackish water could be a valuable source of additional water supply for commercial, municipal, or industrial uses, enabling economic development in those areas without impairing existing water rights or straining existing supplies.
