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1	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
2	SECTION 1. Section 17-1-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1921,
3	Chapter 35, Section 1, as amended) is amended to read:
4	"17-1-1. <u>DECLARATION OF POLICY</u> It is the purpose of
5	[ <del>this act</del> ] <u>Chapter 17 NMSA 1978</u> and the policy of the state [ <del>of</del>
6	New Mexico to provide an adequate and flexible system for the
7	protection of the game and fish of New Mexico and for their use
8	and development for public recreation and food supply and to
9	provide for their propagation, planting, protection, regulation
10	and conservation to the extent necessary to provide and
11	maintain an adequate supply of game and fish within the state
12	of New Mexico] to provide for the conservation and management
13	of the state's wildlife as a public trust resource with
14	intrinsic and ecological value, as well as for the benefit,
15	use, food supply and nonconsumptive enjoyment of all."
16	SECTION 2. Section 17-2A-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996,
17	Chapter 89, Section 3) is recompiled as Section 17-1-1.1 NMSA
18	1978 and is amended to read:
19	"17-1-1.1. DEFINITIONSFor the purposes of Chapter 17
20	NMSA 1978:
21	A. "commission" or "state game commission" means
22	the state wildlife commission;
23	<u>B. "department" or "department of game and fish"</u>
24	means the wildlife department;
25	<u>C. "director", "warden", "state warden", "state</u>
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game warden" or "state game and fish warden" means the director of the wildlife department;

3 [A.] D. "hunt code" means a description used to identify and define the species, weapon type and time frame authorized for a specific hunt;

[B.] E. "outfitter" or "guide" means a person who advertises or holds [himself] the person's self out to the public for hire or is employed or accepts compensation for 8 providing, within the unit where a hunt occurs, facilities, equipment or services for hunting activities; provided, however, that "outfitter" or "guide" does not include a person who only cooks, cuts wood or performs other comparable or incidental duties not directly related to hunting activities; and

[G.] F. "unit" means a geographically bound area in the state that is used to manage game species."

SECTION 3. Section 17-1-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1921, Chapter 35, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read:

"17-1-2. STATE [GAME] WILDLIFE COMMISSION--APPOINTMENT--TERM.--

A. To carry out the purpose of Chapter 17 NMSA 1978 and all other acts for like purpose, there is created a "state [game] wildlife commission" of seven members, [not more than four of whom shall be of the same political party at the time of their appointment. The members of the commission shall be .227851.1

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1	appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the
2	senate. The term of office for each member of the commission
3	shall be four years. At the time of making the first
4	appointments, the governor shall designate the commissioners'
5	terms as being one, two, three or four years so that the term
6	of no more than two commissioners shall expire each year.
7	In making appointments to the state game commission, one
8	member shall be appointed from each of the following districts:
9	A. district one: Curry, De Baca, Roosevelt,
10	Chaves, Lincoln, Otero, Eddy and Lea counties;
11	B. district two: Catron, Socorro, Grant, Hidalgo,
12	Luna, Sierra and Dona Ana counties;
13	C. district three: San Juan, McKinley, Cibola,
14	Valencia, Sandoval, Los Alamos and Rio Arriba counties;
15	D. district four: Santa Fe, Taos, Colfax, Union,
16	Mora, Harding, Quay, San Miguel, Guadalupe and Torrance
17	counties; and
18	E. district five: Bernalillo county. The
19	remaining two members shall be appointed at-large. At least
20	one member of the commission shall manage and operate a farm or
21	ranch that contains at least two species of wildlife on that
22	part which is deeded land requiring licensing prior to legal
23	pursuit under the provisions of Section 17-3-2 NMSA 1978. At
24	least one member shall have a demonstrated history of
25	involvement in wildlife and habitat protection issues and whose
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activities or occupation are not in conflict with wildlife and
habitat advocacy. The state game commission as provided in
Chapter 17 NMSA 1978 shall have the same authority, powers and
duties as now vested in the state game commission by law and
each member of the state game commission shall serve until his
successor has been appointed and qualified] all of whom shall
be New Mexico residents. The governor shall appoint the
initial members of the commission for terms beginning January
, 2027 and make subsequent appointments from a list of
qualified nominees submitted to the governor by the state
wildlife commission nominating committee.

<u>B. Three at-large members of the commission shall</u> <u>possess knowledge of wildlife issues in the state and hold</u> <u>positions one, two and three, with no more than one member</u> <u>residing in any one county and with no more than two members</u> affiliated with the same political party.

C. Four members of the commission shall hold positions four, five, six and seven, with no more than one member residing in any one county and with no more than two members affiliated with the same political party, as follows: (1) position four, a rancher or farmer who owns or manages a New Mexico ranch or farm, on which at least two species of animals for which game hunting is licensed under the provisions of Section 17-3-2 NMSA 1978 are frequently present;

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1	(2) position five, a conservationist who for
2	the previous four years has been an employee, a member of the
3	board or a member of an established advisory committee of a
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	nonprofit habitat or wildlife conservation organization, the
5	primary focus of which is not game species;
6	(3) position six, a hunter or angler who has
7	held a New Mexico hunting or fishing license each of the
8	previous four years; and
9	(4) position seven, a scientist who holds at
10	least a master's degree from an accredited college or
11	university in wildlife biology, conservation biology, fisheries
12	science or management, wildlife science or management or a
13	comparable wildlife field.

A person shall not be eligible to be appointed 11 12 as a commissioner if the person changed party affiliation during the previous four years; provided that a person who 13 changed party affiliation for the purpose of voting in a 14 primary election pursuant to Section 1-4-5.7 NMSA 1978 and then 15 changed party affiliation back to the status of that person's 16 party affiliation immediately prior to the change within ninety 17 days shall not be considered to have changed party affiliation 18 for the purposes of this subsection. 19 I. The director of the New Mexico outdoor 20 recreation division of the economic development department or 21 the director's designee shall be an advisor to the commission." 22 SECTION 4. A new Section 17-1-2.1 NMSA 1978 is enacted to 23 read: 24 "17-1-2.1. [NEW MATERIAL] STATE WILDLIFE COMMISSION 25 .227851.1

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1 NOMINATING COMMITTEE.--

2 The "state wildlife commission nominating Α. 3 committee" is created and consists of seven members as follows: 4 (1) four members appointed as follows: one by 5 the speaker of the house of representatives, one by the minority floor leader of the house of representatives, one by 6 7 the president pro tempore of the senate and one by the minority 8 floor leader of the senate; 9 (2) two members as follows: the chair of the university of New Mexico's department of biology or the chair's 10 designee and the chair of New Mexico state university's 11 12 department of fish, wildlife and conservation ecology or the chair's designee; and 13 (3) one member appointed by the governor who 14 shall represent an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo. 15 A committee member shall serve without Β. 16 compensation but shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in 17 pursuit of the member's duties on the committee pursuant to the 18 Per Diem and Mileage Act. 19 The committee and individual members shall be C. 20 subject to the Governmental Conduct Act, the Inspection of 21 Public Records Act, the Financial Disclosure Act and the Open 22 Meetings Act. 23 Administrative support shall be provided to the D. 24 committee by the staff of the department. 25

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E. Appointments shall be made no later than thirty
 days before the end of a term.

The committee shall select one member to be 3 F. 4 chair and one member to be secretary. Following the first 5 meeting, the committee shall meet as often as necessary in order to submit a list to the governor of between seven and ten 6 qualified nominees for positions one, two and three of the 7 commission and between two and five qualified nominees for each 8 of positions four, five, six and seven of the commission. 9 The list shall be developed to provide geographical and political 10 party diversity, and nominees on the list shall be from at 11 12 least seven different counties of the state.

G. The committee shall meet at least ninety days prior to the date on which the term of a state wildlife commissioner ends and as often as necessary thereafter in order to submit a list to the governor, at least thirty days prior to the beginning of the new term, of no fewer than four qualified nominees from diverse geographical areas of the state with no more than two nominees affiliated with the same political party for appointment to the commission for each commissioner position term that is ending.

H. Upon the occurrence of a vacancy in a state wildlife commissioner position, the committee shall meet within thirty days of the date of the beginning of the vacancy and as often as necessary thereafter in order to submit a list to the

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governor, within sixty days of the first meeting after the vacancy occurs, of no fewer than four qualified nominees from diverse geographical areas of the state with no more than two nominees affiliated with the same political party for appointment to the commission to fill the remainder of the term of each commissioner position that is vacant.

I. If a position on the committee becomes vacant during a term, a successor shall be selected in the same manner as the original appointment for that position and shall serve for the remainder of the term of the position vacated.

J. The committee shall actively solicit, accept and evaluate applications from qualified individuals for a position on the commission and may require an applicant to submit any information it deems relevant to the consideration of the individual's application.

K. The committee shall select nominees for submission to the governor who, in the committee's judgment, are best qualified to serve as a member of the commission. A person shall not be eligible for nomination to the commission while serving on the committee.

L. A majority vote of all members of the committee in favor of a person is required for that person to be included on the list of qualified nominees submitted to the governor."

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SECTION 5. Section 17-1-26 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1931, Chapter 117, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read:

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## "17-1-26. RULEMAKING POWER.--

<u>A.</u> The [state game] commission is [hereby] authorized and directed to make [such] rules [and regulations] and establish [such] service as it may deem necessary to carry out all the provisions and purposes of [this Act] Chapter 17 <u>NMSA 1978</u> and all other acts relating to [game and fish, and in making such rules and regulations and in providing when] <u>wildlife.</u>

<u>B. The rules may include, as applicable, when,</u> <u>where, by what means and</u> to what extent, if at all, [<del>and by</del> <del>what means game animals, birds and fish</del>] <u>wildlife</u> may be hunted, taken, captured, killed, possessed, <u>released, bartered</u>, sold, purchased, [<del>and</del>] shipped <u>and imported into or exported</u> <u>from</u> the state. [<del>game and fish</del>]

<u>C. In making rules, the</u> commission shall <u>evaluate</u> <u>and</u> give due [<del>regard to the zones of temperatures and to the</del> <del>distribution, abundance, economic value and breeding habits of</del> <del>such game animals, birds and fish.</del>

The state game commission is hereby authorized to spend such reasonable amounts as in its judgment is desirable and necessary annually, from their funds not otherwise needed, for the eradication of predatory animals] consideration to a species' population size and trends, migration patterns, availability of suitable habitat response to changes in climate conditions, conservation actions necessary to sustain healthy

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populations and ecosystems and any other factors, natural or human-driven, that are judged to affect the health of a species or a species' ecosystem."

SECTION 6. Section 17-1-28 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1939, Chapter 19, Section 1) is amended to read:

6 "17-1-28. ASSENT TO ACT OF CONGRESS.--The state of New 7 Mexico hereby assents to the provisions of the act of congress 8 of the United States of America entitled "An act to provide 9 that the United States shall aid the states in wildlife restoration projects, and for other purposes", approved 10 September [7] 2, 1937 (Public Law Number 415, 75th Congress), 11 12 also known as the federal Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act, and the [state game] commission is hereby 13 authorized and directed to perform all [such] acts as may be 14 necessary to the conduct and establishment of cooperative 15 wildlife restoration projects as defined by [said] that act of 16 congress and in compliance with [said] that act and rules and 17 regulations promulgated by the [secretary of agriculture] 18 United States secretary of the interior thereunder." 19

SECTION 7. Section 17-1-29 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1939, Chapter 19, Section 2) is amended to read:

"17-1-29. <u>DISTRIBUTION OF FEDERAL FUNDS</u>.--The [state game] commission is authorized to receive any [moneys] money to which the state [of New Mexico] may become entitled under the [aforesaid act of congress] federal Pittman-Robertson Wildlife .227851.1

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1 <u>Restoration Act</u>. Such [moneys] money, when received, [to] 2 shall be deposited with the state treasurer [of the state of 3 New Mexico] to the credit of the [state] game protection fund, 4 expended for the purpose designated and withdrawn [and] as 5 other [moneys are] money is withdrawn from the [state] game protection fund." 6 7 SECTION 8. A new section of the Wildlife Conservation Act 8 is enacted to read: "[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] WILDLIFE TO BE PROTECTED--MANAGEMENT.--9 In addition to other species defined in statute, 10 Α. the commission is authorized to extend management and 11 12 protection by rule or policy to any species of wildlife not protected by statute pursuant to Chapter 17 NMSA 1978. 13 When determining whether and how to protect a 14 Β. species of wildlife, the commission shall evaluate and give due 15 consideration to: 16 whether a species qualifies as a species (1) 17 of greatest conservation need; 18 (2) the science-based reasons for protection 19 of a species; and 20 the rules and management programs that (3) 21 would potentially accompany protected status. 22 C. The department is not required to respond to 23 wildlife nuisance incidents unless: 24 the commission, in its own discretion, (1) 25 .227851.1 - 13 -

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1 adopts a policy or rule to do so; or 2 as otherwise provided by law. (2) 3 As used in this section, "wildlife" means a D. 4 nondomestic mammal, bird, reptile, amphibian, fish or 5 invertebrate species, including a living animal, or any part, egg, spawn, offspring or the dead body or parts thereof." 6 7 SECTION 9. Section 17-2-38 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1974, 8 Chapter 83, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read: 9 "17-2-38. DEFINITIONS.--As used in the Wildlife 10 Conservation Act: "commission" means the state [game] wildlife 11 Α. 12 commission; Β. "director" means the director of the wildlife 13 14 department [of game and fish]; C. "ecosystem" means a system of living organisms 15 and their environment; 16 "endangered species" means any species of fish 17 D. or wildlife whose prospects of survival or recruitment within 18 the state are in jeopardy due to any of the following factors: 19 the present or threatened destruction, 20 (1)modification or curtailment of its habitat; 21 overutilization for scientific, commercial (2) 22 or sporting purposes; 23 the effect of disease or predation; (3) 24 other natural or man-made factors (4) 25 .227851.1 - 14 -

"investigation" means a process pursuant to Subsections B through L of Section 17-2-40 NMSA 1978 undertaken whenever the director suspects that a species may be threatened or endangered and [which] that consists of a formal review of existing data and studies and may include additional field research to determine whether a species is threatened or endangered;

"land or aquatic habitat interests" means F. interests in real property or water rights consisting of fee simple title, easements in perpetuity, time certain easements, long-term leases and short-term leases;

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1 "management" means the collection and G. 2 application of biological information for the purposes of 3 establishing and maintaining a congruous relationship between 4 individuals within species and populations of wildlife and the 5 carrying capacity of their habitat. The term includes the entire range of activities that constitutes a full scientific 6 7 resource program [of], including [but not limited to] research, 8 census, law enforcement, propagation, acquisition or 9 maintenance of land or aquatic habitat interests appropriate for recovery of the species; improvement and maintenance, 10 education and related activities; [or] and protection and 11 12 regulated taking;

H. "recovery plan" means a designated program or methodology reasonably expected to lead to restoration and maintenance of a species and its habitat;

I. "peer review panel" means an advisory panel of scientists, each of whom possesses expertise relevant to the proposed investigation and at least one of whom is a wildlife biologist, convened to review the scientific methodology for collection and analysis of data by a researcher based on commonly accepted scientific peer review;

J. "species" means any species or subspecies;

K. "substantial public interest" means a nonfrivolous claim indicated by a broad-based expression of public concern;

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1 "take" or "taking" means to harass, hunt, L. 2 capture or kill any wildlife or attempt to do so; 3 "threatened species" means any species that is Μ. 4 likely to become an endangered species within the foreseeable 5 future throughout all or a significant portion of its range in New Mexico; the term may also include any species of fish or 6 7 wildlife appearing on the United States list of endangered native and foreign fish and wildlife as set forth in Section 4 8 9 of the <u>federal</u> Endangered Species Act of 1973 as threatened species; provided that the commission adopts the list in whole 10 or in part; and 11 12 N. "wildlife" means [any] a nondomestic mammal, bird, reptile, amphibian, fish [mollusk or crustacean] or 13 invertebrate species, including a living animal, or any part, 14 egg, spawn, [or] offspring or the dead body or parts thereof." 15 SECTION 10. A new section of the Wildlife Conservation 16 Act is enacted to read: 17 "[NEW MATERIAL] SPECIES OF GREATEST CONSERVATION NEED--18 DEFINITION--REPORTING.--19 Α. For the purposes of Chapter 17 NMSA 1978, 20 "species of greatest conservation need" means species existing 21 within New Mexico that are subject to one or more of the 22 following factors: 23 species that have experienced substantial (1)24

long-term declines in habitat or population, known as declining .227851.1 - 17 -

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species;

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2	(2) species in which some aspect of their life
3	histories and ecology makes them disproportionately susceptible
4	to decline, including concentration to small areas during
5	migration or hibernation, low reproductive rates,
6	susceptibility to disease, inability to respond to changing
7	climate conditions, habitat loss, wildfire and overexploitation
8	for anthropogenic purposes, known as vulnerable species;
9	(3) species that are limited to New Mexico,
10	known as endemic species;
11	(4) species that have populations
12	geographically isolated from other populations of the same
13	species and are thereby susceptible to local decline or
14	extirpation, known as disjunct species; or
15	(5) species that are crucial to the integrity
16	and the functioning of their ecosystems and that may represent
17	more value to conservation of biological diversity than the
18	size of their population or their distribution would suggest,
19	known as keystone species.
20	B. The wildlife department shall report annually by
21	November 1 to the appropriate interim legislative committee and
22	publish on the department's website data collected on species
23	of greatest conservation need and the use of state and federal
24	funds for the support and recovery of species of greatest
25	conservation need."

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1	SECTION 11. Section 17-3-13 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1964
2	(lst S.S.), Chapter 17, Section 5, as amended) is amended to

8	separately. Upon satisfactory proof that a license or permit
9	has been lost before its expiration, the director may issue a
