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15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:			
16	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLEThis act may be cited as the			
17	"2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".			
18	SECTION 2. PURPOSEFor the purpose of providing funds			
19	for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2024 Capital			
20	Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation			
21	indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and			

in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--

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A. The state board of finance, except as limited by the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act,

shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued pursuant to that act, including:

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3 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations
4 and maturities;

(2) principal amounts;

(3) rate or rates of interest; and

7 (4) provisions for redemption, including
8 premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds
9 are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating
10 to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state
board of finance determines with an appropriate series
designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in
the resolution of the state board of finance.

C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the paying agent within or without the state as the state board of finance may direct.

D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in

book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical
 securities.

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E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

F. The full faith and credit of the state is
pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of
and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the
2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at

private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less 1 2 than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If 3 sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of 4 general circulation in the state and may also publish the 5 notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state. 6 The required publications shall be made once each week for 7 8 two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior 9 to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the 10 amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds 11 to be offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which 12 the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place 13 specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall 14 open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the 15 bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The 16 state board of finance may reject any or all bids and 17 readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All 18 bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a 19 deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds 20 in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The 21 deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon 22 rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also 23 sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state 24 treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer 25

or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

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SECTION 6. EXPENSES.--The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of the state, legally available for such payments.

SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY .-- To provide for the 14 payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued 15 and sold pursuant to the provisions of the 2024 Capital 16 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and 17 there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which 18 any of the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all 19 property in the state subject to property taxation for state 20 purposes sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on 21 the bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a 22 sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes 23 due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be 24 collected to pay administrative costs incident to the 25

collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

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SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer 8 shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and 12 any expenses relating thereto. 13

**SECTION 9.** IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR 14 ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the 15 provisions of the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation 16 Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or 17 mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties 18 required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in 19 that act. The provisions of that act constitute an 20 irrepealable contract with the owners of any of the bonds 21 issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of 22 which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged. 23 Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the 24 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full 25

1 authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized 2 in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of 3 investment securities under the Uniform Commercial Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the 4 proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall 5 be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or 6 holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the 7 8 provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body 9 thereof. 10

SECTION 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of bonds issued under the provisions of the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

16	SECTION 11. ELECTION			
17	A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2024 Capital			
18	Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to			
19	the registered voters of the state at the general election to			
20	be held in November 2024, and, if they receive a majority of			
21	all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take			
22	effect upon certification of the state canvassing board			
23	announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be			
24	issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of			
25	this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and

If any such question is not approved by a majority vote of the electorate at the state's 2024 general election, the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the 2024 general election shall not affect those questions that are approved at the election.

D. The secretary of state shall include the 20 submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds 21 to the people at the 2024 general election, and it shall be 22 included in the general election proclamation. The secretary 23 of state shall cause the 2024 Capital Projects General 24 Obligation Bond Act to be published in full in at least one 25

newspaper in each county of the state if one be published therein, once each week, for four successive weeks next preceding the general election as required by the constitution of New Mexico.

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SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations authorized in the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act include money for the art in public places fund.

SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in the 2024 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

Β. The state agencies and state institutions to 17 which money has been appropriated in the 2024 Capital 18 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for 19 monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure 20 compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and 21 shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered 22 balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal 23 year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or 24 completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be 25
