BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: House Bill 39 amends New Mexico's ticket scalping statute to expand the types of events covered by the offense. The bill expands the existing prohibition to include events presented by the state, its political subdivisions, or qualifying nonprofit organizations, in addition to the current focus on college athletic events. It continues to define ticket scalping as selling or offering tickets for more than the original price charged or printed, with each unlawful sale treated as a separate offense, while allowing authorized service fees under contract. A violation remains a misdemeanor punishable by up to a \$500 fine, less than one year of imprisonment, or both.

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

Status Quo Will Remain.

Events hosted by governmental entities, state educational institutions, and non-profit organizations generally aim to serve the public or for a charitable purpose. Scalping by third parties diverts the purpose from those aims to a profit-driven aim by that third party. The public purchases event tickets and attends events to strengthen the organization or support its mission. Scalping tickets for such events not only diverts the public's financial contributions but may also erode public trust if the funds result in personal gain by a third party rather than for the purpose for which they were given.
