BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: SB30 repeals Section 24-14-18 NMSA 1978, which is a requirement for facilities or attending physicians to report each induced abortion in New Mexico to the state registrar within 5 days. The current section states that patient identifying information will not be included but information about the provider will be.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

None

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

There is no medical reason to report induced abortion information to the state registrar. While current statute protects patient confidentiality, requiring reports which identify physicians and other health care professionals who provide reproductive health care places providers at risk of being doxxed, harassed, or even killed.

New Mexico has a shortage of OB/GYNs, nurse midwives, nurse practitioners, and physician assistants who specialize in gynecologic and reproductive health. Protecting their privacy from doxxing and potential violence would support longevity of practice and appeal to providers from other states who wish to care for patients without the state tracking their names and services in abortion care. This will improve access to care for people in New Mexico.
