1. BILL SUMMARY

a) Synopsis

Senate Bill 190 proposes to authorize the New Mexico Finance Authority to issue and sell revenue bonds for the Gila Regional Cancer Center at the Gila Regional Medical Center for the purpose of designing, constructing, equipping, and furnishing additions and improvements to the regional cancer center in Grant County. After the bonds have been issued, the authority may issue and sell revenue bonds for the purpose of designing, constructing, equipping, and furnishing additions and improvements to a regional cancer treatment center at the Nor-Lea general hospital in Lea County.

b) Significant Issues

Cancer is the second leading cause of death in New Mexico ([NM-IBIS - Query Result - New Mexico Deaths - Leading Causes of Death, Age-Adjusted Rates Ranked by Number of Deaths](#)). In 2024, 3,630 people died from cancer in New Mexico ([NM-IBIS - Query Result - New Mexico Deaths - Leading Causes of Death, Age-Adjusted Rates Ranked by Number of Deaths](#)). Many cancers can be cured if detected early and treated promptly, and the detection and treatment of pre-cancerous conditions can prevent some cancers from developing. Access to cancer care, especially in rural areas, is crucial for patients to receive equitable treatment. Rural and non-metro counties in New Mexico experience higher cancer mortality rates than metro areas ([NM-IBIS - Query Result - New Mexico Deaths - Deaths per 100,000 Population, Age-adjusted](#)), making it essential to provide accessible cancer screening and treatment services in those areas.

Grant and Lea counties are non-metro counties located four to five hours from Albuquerque, which houses the only NCI-designated cancer center in New Mexico. Having localized cancer centers in these counties reduces many of the structural barriers associated with cancer care. On average, 178 people in Grant County and 249 people in Lea County are diagnosed annually with cancer ([NM-IBIS - Query Result - Cancer Incidence by NM County - Cancer Incidence per 100,000 Population, Age-adjusted](#)).

Rural communities face structural barriers including healthcare shortages, under-resourced hospitals, transportation challenges, and poor internet reliability (www.ruralhealth.us). The revenue from this bill would increase access to services and help reduce disparities in these areas.

Residents of Grant and Lea counties and surrounding areas are impacted by these cancer centers and their ability to maintain the infrastructure and equipment needed to adequately function. This bill would have the potential to increase access to cancer care, potentially improving health status in these counties.

11. WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL?

If Senate Bill 190 is not enacted, the New Mexico Finance Authority will not issue and sell revenue bonds for the Gila Regional Cancer Center at the Gila Regional Medical Center for the purpose of designing, constructing, equipping, and furnishing additions and improvements to the regional cancer center in Grant County and the cancer treatment center at the Nor-Lea general hospital in Lea County.
