17	WHEREAS, access to adequate numbers of well-trained health				
18	professionals is critically important to the state's health care				
19	delivery system; and				
20	WHEREAS, thirty-one of New Mexico's thirty-three counties				
21	are designated as health professional shortage areas by the				
22	federal government; and				
23	WHEREAS, an inappropriate geographic mix or supply of				
24	health professionals can increase health costs as well as				
25	restrict access to needed services; and

WHEREAS, establishment of state-specific standards for loan service repayment could assure targeting of health professional resources to the areas of greatest need; and

WHEREAS, different publicly funded recruitment and retention efforts have resulted in some duplicative administrative functions and variable awards for similar programs; and

WHEREAS, consistency in operation, consolidation of like administrative functions and clarity in program purpose would enhance the effectiveness of health professional recruitment and retention efforts; and

WHEREAS, local rural communities are the direct beneficiaries of recruitment and retention efforts, and they may provide valuable insights into their unique needs; and

WHEREAS, perceived barriers exist that limit the selection of rural areas of New Mexico by health professionals as locations in which to practice, resulting in difficulty in retaining health professionals, particularly for community-based rural health clinics; and

WHEREAS, currently most health professionals in New Mexico are trained out of state; and

WHEREAS, certain populations, such as the uninsured and medicaid beneficiaries, are particularly vulnerable to lack of available providers in a given geographic area; and

WHEREAS, an extensive network of two-year post-secondary

educational institutions currently exists in the state, providing accessible and affordable avenues to more advanced health professional education; and

WHEREAS, health professionals who are cross-trained to perform a variety of direct patient care services may provide rural communities with the ability to assure twenty-four hour coverage for these services, improve the efficiency of the delivery system and increase patient satisfaction; and

WHEREAS, health professionals who receive training in their own home towns may be more inclined to remain there to practice and would benefit from alternative approaches to receiving health professional education;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the New Mexico health policy commission work together with the department of health, the university of New Mexico health sciences center and other institutions that train health professionals and the commission on higher education to plan, assess and make recommendations regarding issues of recruitment and retention of health professionals, including the following:

A. identification of state-specific standards for loan repayment with service and alignment of recruitment and retention efforts with state goals for the supply and distribution of health professionals;

B. the establishment of consistent terms and awards

for similar health professional education programs;

C. the consolidation of administrative functions to avoid duplication in health professional recruitment and retention programs;

D. the incorporation of local communities and the private sector into policy decisions regarding health professional recruitment and retention efforts;

E. an assessment of perceived barriers to retention of health professionals, especially in rural areas; an evaluation of the effectiveness of existing initiatives; and the development of specific strategies to remove barriers;

F. a comparison of the potential benefits of recruitment of out-of-state students and state-funded education and training efforts, to assess the cost effectiveness and success of each approach;

G. the development of an appropriate mix of incentives in exchange for service in underserved areas of the state to help provide care to medicaid recipients, the uninsured and other underserved populations;

 H. identification of ways to ease articulation and transfer of credits between institutions, especially between two- and four-year health professional education programs;

I. an assessment of the feasibility and effectiveness of cross-training of health professionals to allow performance of a wider scope of services, including effective

training methods and possible changes to individual licensing acts that may be required; and

J. consideration of modular or other non-traditional education methods to encourage participation of rural health professional candidates and meet the needs of rural working health professionals; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that an interim report of recommendations developed as a result of this cooperative effort be presented to the New Mexico health policy commission and the appropriate interim legislative committee by October 15, 1997 and a final report be presented to the New Mexico health policy commission and the appropriate interim legislative committee by October 15, 1998; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this memorial be sent to the secretary of health, the vice president of the university of New Mexico health sciences center, the chairman of the New Mexico health policy commission and the executive director of the commission on higher education.
