## A JOINT MEMORIAL

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT WITH THE COOPERATION OF THE CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE, THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO, NEW MEXICO STATE UNIVERSITY, THE ENERGY, MINERALS AND NATURAL RESOURCES DEPARTMENT AND OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES TO REVIEW AND EVALUATE ALTERNATIVE WASTEWATER TREATMENT TECHNOLOGIES, INCLUDING CONSTRUCTED WETLANDS.

WHEREAS, population growth in New Mexico has resulted in continually increasing demands for clean water, underscoring the need for existing as well as developing technologies that provide efficient, low-cost and effective water and wastewater treatment; and

WHEREAS, the supply of ground and surface waters are limited and are being adversely impacted by the increased withdrawal and increased contamination from many sources,

including septic tanks; and

WHEREAS, approximately one hundred eighty thousand homes and businesses use on-site sewage treatment and disposal in New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, according to its ground water protection study, in Bernalillo county there are some twenty thousand septic tanks that adversely impact ground water; and

WHEREAS, the reduction in federal budgets for and increasing attention to water quality underscore the need for developing technologies that provide efficient, low-cost and effective water treatment; and

WHEREAS, the use of constructed wetlands may provide a relatively simple and inexpensive solution for controlling many water pollution problems; and

WHEREAS, wetlands provide habitat, restrain floods, moderate climate extremes, cleanse water like a filter and provide many other ecological and cultural benefits; and

WHEREAS, natural wetlands have been lost to human development at an alarming rate over the last few decades; and

WHEREAS, over seven thousand acres of wetlands between Velarde and Elephant Butte along the Rio Grande have been lost to development in the past fifty years; and

WHEREAS, more than one thousand communities in the United States currently are using or developing constructed wetlands as part of their wastewater treatment process; and

WHEREAS, these wetlands may be less expensive to build, operate and maintain than mechanical sewage treatment plants; and

WHEREAS, constructed wetlands are being used in wastewater treatment situations ranging from individual septic tank

WHEREAS, constructed wetlands are being used in wastewater treatment situations ranging from individual septic tank discharges to a twenty million gallon per day operational system in Orlando, Florida and forty-three million gallon per day system proposed for Beaumont, Texas; and

WHEREAS, constructed wetlands have been established in various communities throughout New Mexico, including Albuquerque, Corrales and Santa Fe, and these wetlands demonstrate that we can replenish our water, lost habitats and other ecological values through the use of constructed wetlands;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the department of environment with the cooperation of the city of Albuquerque, the university of New Mexico, New Mexico state university, the energy, minerals and natural resources department and other interested parties review and evaluate alternative wastewater treatment technologies, including constructed wetlands, to assist communities, industries and agricultural enterprises to cleanse polluted water and replenish lost ecological values; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the department of environment and cooperating entities report any findings and recommendations to the integrated water and resource planning committee before

its final 1997 meeting; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this memorial be transmitted to the secretary of environment, the mayor of Albuquerque, the presidents of the university of New Mexico and New Mexico state university and the secretary of energy, minerals and natural resources.
