16	Section 1. SHORT TITLEThis act may be cited as the
17	"Drug Trafficker Liability Act".
18	Section 2. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Drug Trafficker
19	Liability Act:
20	A. "controlled substance" means a "controlled
21	substance", a "counterfeit substance" or a "controlled
22	substance analog" as defined in Section 30-31-2 NMSA 1978;
23	B. "illegal user" means a person who acquires a
24	controlled substance from a person who traffics in controlled

"trafficker" means a person who traffics. 4 CAUSE OF ACTION -- PRESUMPTION OF INJURY. --Section 3. 5 A person other than an illegal user may recover 6 A. 7 damages from an illegal user's trafficker for an injury that 8 is proximately caused by an illegal user's use of a controlled 9 substance. 10 An illegal user may recover damages from a **B**. 11 trafficker for an injury that is proximately caused by the 12 illegal user's use of a controlled substance if: 13 prior to filing the action, the illegal (1)14 user discloses to a law enforcement authority the identity of the trafficker; 15 16 prior to filing the action, the illegal (2) 17 user has not used a controlled substance for thirty days; and 18 the illegal user does not use a (3) 19 controlled substance during the pendency of the action. 20 C. A trafficker is presumed to have injured the plaintiff and to have acted willfully and wantonly if the 21 plaintiff is: 22 23 a parent, legal guardian, child, spouse (1) or sibling of the illegal user; 24 25 (2)a person whose mother was the illegal . 125234. 2 - 2 -

The cause of action established by the Drug 10 Trafficker Liability Act is in addition to and not in lieu of 11 any other cause of action available to a plaintiff. 12 Section 4. PRESUMPTIONS--EFFECT OF CRIMINAL DRUG CONVICTION. - -13 14 A. If a person has been convicted of trafficking in a controlled substance pursuant to Section 30-31-20 NMSA 15 16 1978, that person is presumed to have trafficked in a controlled substance pursuant to the Drug Trafficker Liability 17 18 This presumption is rebuttable. Act. 19 A person convicted of violating the Controlled **B**. 20 Substances Act or the federal Comprehensive Drug Abuse 21 Prevention and Control Act of 1970 by trafficking in a 22 controlled substance to an illegal user is estopped from 23 denying trafficking in a controlled substance. The conviction 24 is also prima facie evidence of the person's trafficking in a 25 controlled substance during the two years preceding the date

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The absence of a conviction of a person against 2 C. whom recovery is sought does not bar an action against that 3 4 person. DAMAGES- - INSURANCE EXCLUSION. - -5 Section 5. A person, other than an illegal user, who is 6 A. 7 entitled to a recovery pursuant to the Drug Trafficker Liability Act may recover the following: 8 9 (1) economic or noneconomic and exemplary 10 damages; any pecuniary or nonpecuniary loss 11 (2) 12 proximately caused by an illegal user's use of a controlled 13 substance: and 14 (3) reasonable attorney fees and costs. B. An illegal user entitled to recovery under the 15 16 Drug Trafficker Liability Act may recover the following: economic damages; 17 (1) 18 any pecuniary loss proximately caused by (2)19 an illegal user's use of a controlled substance; and 20 reasonable attorney fees and costs. (3) No damages, including those based on vicarious 21 С. 22 liability or parental responsibility, that are assessed 23 pursuant to the Drug Trafficker Liability Act shall be payable 24 or claimed under any insurance policy, and no duty to defend 25 or indemnify shall be required for any civil complaint brought . 125234. 2

2 Section 6. COMPARATIVE NEGLIGENCE. -- An action by an illegal user pursuant to the Drug Trafficker Liability Act is 3 4 governed by the principles of comparative negligence. 5 Negligence shall not be attributed to a plaintiff who is not an illegal user, unless that plaintiff willfully and knowingly 6 7 gave the illegal user the controlled substance or money for its purchase. 8 9 Section 7. ATTACHMENT--PROPERTY SUBJECT TO LEVY.--10 A. After commencing an action under the Drug 11 Trafficker Liability Act, a plaintiff may seek a writ of 12 attachment by filing a motion supported by an affidavit 13 setting forth specific facts showing all of the following: 14 (1)a description of the injury claimed and a statement that the affiant in good faith believes that the 15 defendant is liable in a stated amount; 16 17 (2)the defendant is subject to the judicial 18 jurisdiction of the state; and after diligent effort, the plaintiff 19 (3) 20 cannot serve the defendant with process. 21 If an attachment action is instituted, a **B**. 22 defendant is entitled to an immediate hearing. Attachment may 23 be lifted if the defendant demonstrates that the assets will 24 be available for a potential award or if the defendant posts a 25 bond sufficient to cover a potential award. . 125234. 2

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C. A person against whom a judgment has been rendered under the Drug Trafficker Liability Act is not eligible to exempt any property from process to levy or process to execute on the judgment. Unless the jury, or the court if there is no jury, specifically finds otherwise, the actions for which a person is found liable under the Drug Trafficker Liability Act are willful and malicious, and the 8 judgment is not subject to discharge under federal bankruptcy law.

An asset shall not be used to satisfy a D. judgment under the Drug Trafficker Liability Act if that asset is named in or has been seized for a forfeiture action by the state or the United States before a plaintiff commences an action under that act unless the asset is released after the forfeiture action or is released by the agency that seized the asset.

Section 8. ACCRUAL OF CAUSE OF ACTION--TOLLING OF STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS. --

Except as otherwise provided in this section, a A. cause of action accrues under the Drug Trafficker Liability Act when a person who may recover has reason to know of the harm and that trafficking in a controlled substance is the cause of the harm

B. The statute of limitations is tolled while the person is incapacitated by the use of a controlled substance . 125234. 2 - 6 -

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to the extent that the person cannot reasonably be expected to seek recovery under the Drug Trafficker Liability Act or as otherwise provided by law.

C. A person may bring an action for an injury pursuant to the Drug Trafficker Liability Act within six years of the date the action accrues.

Section 9. PROSECUTIONS--STAYS.--

A. A prosecuting attorney may represent the state or a political subdivision of the state in an action brought pursuant to the provisions of the Drug Trafficker Liability Act.

B. On motion by a governmental agency involved in a controlled substance investigation or prosecution, an action brought pursuant to the Drug Trafficker Liability Act shall be stayed until the completion of the criminal investigation or prosecution that gave rise to the motion for a stay of the action.

C. An action shall not be brought pursuant to the Drug Trafficker Liability Act against a law enforcement officer or agency, or a person acting in good faith at the direction of a law enforcement officer or agency, for participation in illegal marketing of a controlled substance, if that participation is in the furtherance of an official investigation.

Section 10. SEVERABILITY.--If any part of the Drug . 125234.2

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1	Trafficker Liability Act is held invalid, the remainder or its
2	application to other situations or persons shall not be
3	affected.
4	Section 11. EFFECTIVE DATEThe effective date of the
