AN ACT

RELATING TO REVENUE; PROVIDING FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF ONE HUNDRED PERCENT OF LOTTERY NET REVENUES TO THE LOTTERY TUITION FUND; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. Section 6-24-24 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1995, Chapter 155, Section 24) is amended to read:

"6-24-24. DISPOSITION OF REVENUE. - -

A. As nearly as practical, an amount equal to at least fifty percent of the gross annual revenues from the sale of lottery tickets shall be returned to the public in the form of lottery prizes.

B. The authority shall transmit [all] net revenues to the state treasurer who shall deposit [sixty percent of] the revenues [in the public school capital outlay fund for

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1 ~~expenditure pursuant to the provisions of the Public School~~
2 ~~Capital Outlay Act and forty percent]~~ in the lottery tuition
3 fund. Estimated net revenues shall be transmitted monthly to
4 the state treasurer for deposit. ~~[in the funds, provided]~~ The
5 total amount of annual net revenues for the prior fiscal year
6 shall be transmitted no later than August 1 each year.

7 C. In determining net revenues, operating expenses
8 of the lottery include all costs incurred in the operation and
9 administration of the lottery and all costs resulting from any
10 contracts entered into for the purchase or lease of goods or
11 services required by the lottery, including ~~[but not limited~~
12 ~~to]~~ the costs of supplies, materials, tickets, independent
13 audit services, independent studies, data transmission,
14 advertising, promotion, incentives, public relations,
15 communications, commissions paid to lottery retailers,
16 printing, distribution of tickets, purchases of annuities or
17 investments to be used to pay future installments of winning
18 lottery tickets, debt service and payment of any revenue bonds
19 issued, contingency reserves, transfers to the reserve fund
20 and any other necessary costs incurred in carrying out the
21 provisions of the New Mexico Lottery Act.

22 D. An amount up to two percent of the gross annual
23 revenues shall be set aside as a reserve fund to cover bonuses
24 and incentive plans for lottery retailers, special promotions
25 for retailers, purchasing special promotional giveaways,

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1 sponsoring special promotional events, compulsive gambling
2 rehabilitation and such other purposes as the board deems
3 necessary to maintain the integrity and meet the revenue goals
4 of the lottery. The board shall report annually to the
5 governor and each regular session of the legislature on the
6 use of the money in the reserve fund. Any balance in excess
7 of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) at the end of any fiscal
8 year shall be transferred to the lottery tuition fund."

9 Section 2. REPEAL.--Laws 1995, Chapter 155, Section 38
10 is repealed.

11 Section 3. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public
12 peace, health and safety that this act take effect
13 immediately.

Section 1. Section 6-24-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1995,
Chapter 155, Section 3) is amended to read:

"6-24-3. PURPOSES. -- The purposes of the New Mexico
Lottery Act are to:

A. establish and provide for the conduct of a fair
and honest lottery for the entertainment of the public; and

B. provide the maximum amount of revenues, without
imposing additional taxes or using other state revenues, for
the purposes of:

(1) funding critical capital outlay needs of

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the public schools; and

(2) providing tuition assistance to resident undergraduates at New Mexico post-secondary educational institutions, which shall be known as "legislative lottery success scholarships". "

Section 2. Section 6-24-23 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1995, Chapter 155, Section 23, as amended) is amended to read:

"6-24-23. [~~LOTTERY TUITION~~] LEGISLATIVE LOTTERY SUCCESS SCHOLARSHIP FUND CREATED--PURPOSE. --

A. The "~~lottery tuition~~ legislative lottery success scholarship fund" is created in the state treasury. The fund shall be administered by the commission on higher education. Earnings from investment of the fund shall accrue to the credit of the fund. Any balance in the fund at the end of any fiscal year shall remain in the fund for appropriation by the legislature as provided in this section.

B. After appropriation, if any, by the legislature for scholarships pursuant to Subsection C of Section 21-1-2 NMSA 1978, the remaining money in the [~~lottery tuition~~] legislative lottery success scholarship fund is appropriated to the commission on higher education for distribution to New Mexico's public post-secondary educational institutions to provide tuition assistance for New Mexico resident undergraduates as provided by law. "

Section 3. Section 6-24-24 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1995, Chapter 155, Section 24) is amended to read:

"6-24-24. DISPOSITION OF REVENUE. --

A. As nearly as practical, an amount equal to at

2 annual report, describe the organizational structure of the
3 authority and summarize the functions performed by each
4 organizational division within the authority;

5 (2) maintain weekly or more frequent records of
6 lottery transactions, including the distribution of lottery
7 tickets to retailers, revenue received, claims for prizes,
8 prizes paid, prizes forfeited and other financial transactions
9 of the authority; and

10 (3) use the state government fiscal year.

11 B. The board shall provide, for informational
12 purposes, to the department of finance and administration and
13 the legislative finance committee, by December 1 of each year,
14 a copy of the annual proposed operating budget for the
15 authority for the succeeding fiscal year. This budget
16 proposal shall also be accompanied by an estimate of the net
17 revenues to be deposited in the public school capital outlay
18 fund and the [~~lottery tuition~~] legislative lottery success
19 scholarship fund for the current and succeeding fiscal years.

20 C. The board shall contract with an independent
21 certified public accountant or firm for an annual financial
22 audit of the authority. The certified public accountant or
23 firm shall have no financial interest in any lottery
24 contractor. The certified public accountant or firm shall
25 present an audit report no later than March 1 for the prior

1 fiscal year. The certified public accountant or firm shall
 2 evaluate the internal auditing controls in effect during the
 3 audit period. The cost of this financial audit shall be an
 4 operating expense of the authority. The legislative finance
 5 committee may, at any time, order an audit of any phase of the
 6 operations of the authority, at the expense of the authority,
 7 and shall receive a copy of the annual independent financial
 8 audit. A copy of any audit performed by the certified public
 9 accountant or ordered by the legislative finance committee
 10 shall be transmitted to the governor, the speaker of the house
 11 of representatives, the president pro tempore of the senate,
 12 the legislative finance committee and the lottery oversight
 13 committee. "

9 Rehabilitation Act.
