SUMMARY

Synopsis of SRC Substitute for Senate Bill 238

The Senate Rules Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 238 (SB238) removes the requirement that a majority of the Governor's Residence Advisory Commission be appointed by the governor from a list of names submitted by the Governor's Mansion Foundation, a nonprofit organization. The bill also renames the commission the Governor's Residence Management Committee.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Changing the appointment process and name of the Governor's Resident Advisory Commission is unlikely to have a fiscal impact. Based on tax filings from 2024, the Governor's Mansion Foundation raises about \$50 thousand.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The Governor's Residence Advisory Commission has responsibility to:

- Manage furniture, art, landscaping and decorations for the governor's mansion;
- Make recommendations to the General Services Department (GSD) and Legislature on maintenance and repair of the governor's mansion;

- Accept money from public and private sources; and
- Develop statewide interest in the governor's mansion, including by providing public promotions and materials.

Current law specifies that a majority of the committee must be appointed based on lists provided to the governor by the Governor's Mansion Foundation, a nonprofit organization. SB238 would remove restrictions on the governor's appointments, allowing the governor to appoint any member of the public to the commission, which would also be renamed the Governor's Residence Management Committee.
