 - i. College Success Our Dual Credit courses are taught in conjunction with our AP courses. Curriculum meetings are held with NMJC professors to ensure validity and rigor. All students take an AP course at the end of the course.
 - ii. Honor Graduation as of 2016-2017 school year, all dual credit courses are eligible courses for our current Honor Graduation Requirements.
 - b. Aligned Resources (Thank you for passing the Perkins Reassurance ⁽³⁾)
 - i. Perkins and Workforce Readiness Grant Courses were created at HHS that meet dual credit requirements as well as certifications.
 - ii. Example Hobbs High School Students received over 356 certifications in courses that were also dual credit. (Horticulture, Culinary Arts, Vet Science, Welding, Power Lines, Alternative Energy, Food Production) Even if the students did not go to college, they still left with a certification to help them in the workforce.
