

### **Definition of Key Terms**

#### Culture

 The patterns of beliefs, practices, and traditions associated with a group of people.<sup>1</sup>

#### Linguistic Responsiveness


 Teaching practices that support the learning, development, and engagement of children from diverse linguistic backgrounds.<sup>2</sup>

#### Equity

 In practice, equity means all children and families receive necessary supports in a timely fashion so they can develop their full intellectual, social, and physical potential.<sup>1</sup>

### **Prenatal-to-Three Guiding Principles for Equity**

- 1. Family Voice, Power, and Shared Decision-Making Leads to Equitable Services
- 2. Respect and Celebrate Language and Culture
- 3. Self-Awareness and Reflection and Leads to Healing Interactions and Relationships
- 4. Actively Transforming Systems is Essential
- 5. Respect and Include Tribes and Tribal Sovereignty
- 6. Value Diverse Community Knowledge and Experience


