


Displays number of unique students participation in dual credit









Mathematics Achievement

Elementary Math

- Quadrupled the percentage of students on grade level from 8% to 38% from BOY to EOY
- Decreased the percentage of students two or more grade levels below from 39% to 18% from (BOY in Aug/Sept to EOY in May)

Secondary Math

 The iMSSA BOY to EOY growth summary shows that more than half of our students (64%) are showing expected growth or above expected growth at each grade level.

Creating experiental learning opportunities that support students to become college and career-ready.

Capital Outlay Requests



Construction of a new 50,000 square foot CTE facility at Mayfield High School (Estimated Cost - \$22 million)

Featuring:

- A hands-on automotive shop and mechanics lab
- An aerospace lab
- A culinary arts lab with industrial kitchen
- A welding and metal fabrication shop
- A dedicated lab for the construction trades industry
- All CTE spaces will include dedicated restrooms, parking/security and offices



<u>Creation of a new 50,000 square foot CTE classroom wing at Mayfield High School (Estimated Cost - \$20 million)</u>

Including:

- Demonstration facilities, computer labs, a drafting/CAD/architecture suite with restrooms and office space
- This classroom wing would be located in a second story above the labs/shops mentioned above



Multi-purpose maker spaces at each LCPS middle school (Estimated Cost - \$8 million)

- 5,000 square foot building space at each campus (8 in total) with 9,000 square feet of yard/outdoor covered work space
- Features multi-purpose spaces, fenced outdoor learning labs and restrooms



Construction of a 10,000 square foot agri-science/vocational agriculture complex at Mayfield High School (Estimated Cost - \$10 million)

Including:

- Classroom space, learning labs, veterinary tech lab, metal fabrication workshop to support practical CTE programs
- Facilities to potentially support animal/livestock projects
- Restrooms, office space



A 5,000 square foot construction trades/welding/metal fabrication workshop space at Organ Mountain High School (Estimated Cost - \$5 million)

To include:

- Expansion of the current construction trades learning lab/workshop
- Storage for equipment/supplies
- Possible addition of a welding/metal fabrication learning lab and workshop space

- Las Cruces Public Schools uses at-risk funding for the initiatives below:
 - Extension of the classroom equal funding support with Athletics, Activities, Fine Arts
 - Community Schools (6 schools)
 - Stipends for bilingual teachers (\$3000)
 - Stipends for TESOL-endorsed teachers (\$1000)
 - International Welcome Center's and Advisors (support for all secondary schools)
 - Behavioral health provider salaries (aligned to teacher salaries)
 - Instructional materials that is culturally and linguistically relevant
 - Bilingual Educational Assistants
 - Supplemental educational assistants for students who receive special education services

Voter Registration Initiatives



National Voter Registration Day- September 20, 2022

- Voter Registration Agents went to each high school
- Approximately 40 students registered to vote

Voter Registration Agents will be available at district events (athletic events, open houses, etc.)

Spring 2023- Teaching & Learning Center VRAs will visit all Principles of Democracy classes to register interested students

- Current Mental Health Service Professional Demonstration Grant Program
 provides competitive grants to support and demonstrate innovative partnerships to
 train school-based mental health service providers for employment in schools and
 local educational agencies (LEAs). (Office of Elementary and Secondary
 Education)
- LCPS is eager to partner with New Mexico Universities to create an innovative partnership to train school-based mental health service providers for employment in schools.
- Our Goal, if secured, this funding could potentially include paid internships or tuition reimbursement for graduate-level counseling and social work students who choose to intern in public schools.
- Paired with other grant funding opportunities such as Project AWARE and Title IV,
 It is altimate outcome will be an increase in school-based mental health
