What's happening at Farmington Schools?

- Remote learning: about 50% of student population
- "Jumpstart Program": Preschool and Special Needs Students
- Hybrid Program K-5 started 9/13/20
- Positive cases (staff): 7
 Positive cases (students): 10
- Approximate number of students and staff on quarantine due to illness or exposure since 10/13/20: 120
- Staff working virtually due to health concerns: 67
- Staff resignations due to COVID: 0 stated





Challenges School Nurses Face

- How we practiced school nursing in a remote setting:
 - Contacted parents for medical histories and immunization compliance.
 - Identified students with chronic health needs. Attended IEP and 504 meetings virtually. Health screenings were done by appointment at one location.
 - Followed up with students that were high risk for mental health issues, domestic violence or socio-economic challenges. Created "virtual health" offices.
 - Developed guidelines and procedures for health room visits and COVIDrelated documentation.
 - Created and presented health education topics via Schoology.

Challenges School Nurses Face (continued)



- Challenges for school nurses during hybrid learning:
 - Screening students and staff prior to entering buildings.
 - Ensuring social distancing, mask-wearing, and hand hygiene.
 - Setting up isolation areas for symptomatic students.
 - Contract tracing and maintaining cohorts.
 - Spreading of misinformation/lack of compliance by staff.
 - Government agencies sending conflicting guidelines and mandates. (PED, DOH, CDC)
 - Supporting students with mental health issues.

Concerns from School Nurses in neighboring districts:

- "Slow and contradictory guidance from the PED and DOH. School Nurses had to rely on NMSNA for COVID protocols and procedures. Our SHA's were re-assigned for a few months, leaving us with no answers."
- Lack of health personnel: "Last year (my) district approved hiring a School Nurse for every school. However, we lacked the funding to continue employment of our Health Assistants, so they were re-assigned as class aides where needed or the position was lost by attrition. Now, when an RN is out, there is no coverage for that health office."
- "There is one nurse for four schools in the Naschitti and Newcomb areas.

 Travel time for EMS is 45 minutes. The presence of a nurse can mean life or death."

Thoughts For Safety and Health Moving Forward

- Provide consistent guidance and offer "next step training" for health staff, teachers, administrators, students, and families.
- Offer stress management and healthy lifestyle opportunities for staff and students.
- Develop COVID-19 curriculum for all grade levels.
- Advocacy for legislation requiring a PED Licensed School Nurse in every school district in New Mexico.
- Advocacy for increased health services for students via School Based Health Centers, including mental health services.
- Including School Nurses and Licensed Mental Health Therapists as part of the legislative funding formula, easing the financial burden for the school districts.
