WHERE ARE WE GOING? **Impact of supporting full** implementation

Findings from a 2015-2018 study in NYC indicate that community schools with full implementation show overwhelming evidence for a positive impact on student outcomes when compared to non-community schools.

Addressing current challenges to full implementation of the Community **Schools strategy in NM**

There is a need to scale, support, and sustain full implementation of the Community School strategy in NM. Sustainable funding, capacity building, evaluation for continuous improvement, and developing statewide tools for full school transformation are identified opportunities.



Challenges to Full Implementation in NM Community Schools

Sustainable Funding

Need for sustainable funding to support continuity of implementation at the school level

Capacity

Capacity at all levels - schoolwide and learning development for community school leaders

Evaluation & Continuous Improvement

Need for rigorous evaluation of community schools that is based on statewide critical practice

Silver Bullet Approaches to School **Transformation**

Education reform efforts typically lean on silver bullet, one-size-fits-all approaches while community schools value local wisdom and require shared leadership



Financial sustainability for technical assistance





Policy Request

Braided and diverse funding for technical assistance and development to support transformation of NM public schools





BELOW THE LINE APPROPRIATION TO PED

Increase funding to \$11.5M with funding set aside; 3% Admin, 7% Technical Assistance



PUBLIC EDUCATION REFORM FUND

\$20M appropriated into the community school fund with purposes under the community schools act expanded to include technical assistance



ESTABLISH A MULTIPLIER THROUGH SEG

1 year pilot program – one-time funding for 5th year schools for technical assistance and certification support. Pilots a sustainable funding source for schools meeting certification requirements in the future.



For this strategy to be effective and sustainable, a system-level support infrastructure needs to be in place.
