## **Agency Overview**

**Vision:** All New Mexico families and young children are thriving.

Mission: Optimize the health, development, education and wellbeing of babies, toddlers, and preschoolers through high-quality, community-based and family-driven early childhood programs and services.

### **Agency Overview: Who We Served in Fiscal Year 2022\***

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### **Five Year Strategic Plan Goals**

### **Goal 1: School Readiness**

ECECD will create and implement equitable, culturally responsive policies, programs, and services that will ensure all children have the skills and knowledge needed to enter kindergarten ready to succeed.

### **GOAL 2: Family and Community Engagement**

ECECD commits to effective, transparent, and trust-based engagement with New Mexico's diverse families and communities to increase family leadership and voice in decision making and program and service design.

### **Goal 3: Government-To-Government**

ECECD will expand and deepen government-to-government relationships and agreements with all Tribes, Pueblos, and Nations with a focus on consultation, culture, language, data sharing, and facility improvements to improve outcomes for Native American families and young children.

### Five Year Strategic Plan Goals continued

### **Goal 4: Early Childhood Ecosystem Alignment**

ECECD will foster coordination and collaboration within and among the early childhood, health, and child welfare sectors to create a holistic, family centered, culturally responsive, and integrated early childhood ecosystem that supports families, reduces child abuse and neglect, and improves school readiness.

### **GOAL 5: Organizational Excellence**

ECECD will have efficient and effective fiscal, human resource, and constituent service systems and information technology infrastructure to meet critical job functions and duties of the department and ensure high quality customer service for all New Mexicans.

### **Goal 6: Actionable Data**

ECECD will collect and share relevant, reliable, and actionable data to inform policy decisions, empower partners to improve, and enhance community understanding of the importance of the prenatal to age five period of development.

### **Five Year Strategic Plan Impact**

## By 2027, ECECD aims to impact families, children, communities, and early childhood professionals through our ambitious goals

- 20,000 more families receive affordable highquality early care and education, bringing the total number of children served to 47,000
- 5,000 additional children enrolled in highquality NM PreK, bringing the total to 20,000 children
- 5,000 additional families engage in evidencebased home visiting, bringing the total to more than 12,000 families served
- 2,000 additional infants and toddlers will have access to high-quality, inclusive child care, bringing the total to 5,500

- 33 counties in New Mexico supported by an active and engaged local early childhood coalition
- 23 Tribes, Pueblos and Nations have improved early childhood facilities supported by a dedicated funding source and technical assistance
- 500 indigenous early childhood educators are supported in achieving higher credentials
- 80 percent of families and babies with Plans of Care will be supported
- 5 regional equity councils are established

## As we move forward over the next five years, these four pillars will guide and help focus the work of the Department



### Pillar 1: Equity Focused

Develop and implement internal and external policies, procedures, and programs that reflect the diverse needs of staff, facilities, and the families and young children we serve.



## Pillar 3: Early Childhood Program Supports

Improve the quality of early childhood programs through the development and implementation of capacity building programs that support continuous improvement.



## Pillar 2: Partner Engagement

Engage partners, families, and the communities we serve throughout the policymaking and implementation process in meaningful ways that allow for authentic and actionable feedback.



## Pillar 4: Systems of Accountability

Meaningful and transparent data is shared with stakeholders regularly, through the development and improvement of data collection and reporting mechanisms.



## **Early Childhood Workforce**

- Competitive Pay for Professionals Grant
   Increases wages for child care workers by \$3/hr
- Higher Education Endowments Grant
   Awarded \$7 million to NM universities and colleges to support and recruit
   Indigenous/bilingual early childhood professionals
- Developing Futures
   Public education campaign that promotes early childhood professions and supports available to people entering the field
- One-time incentive payment
   Distributed \$1,500 distributed to 8,137 early childhood professionals

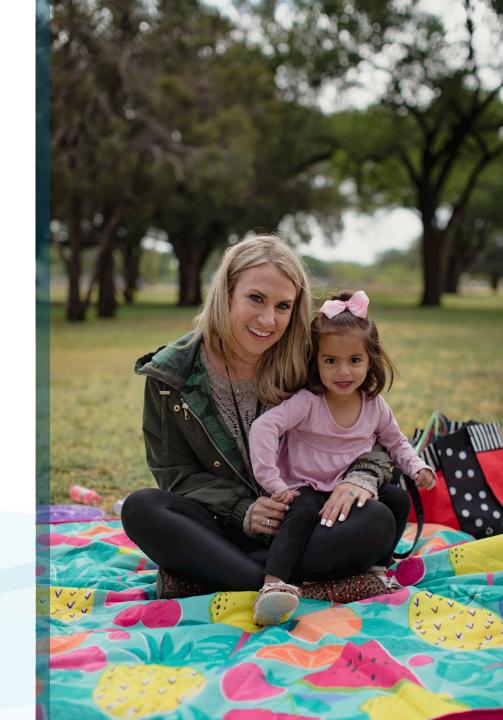


## **Family Supports**

- Expanded Child Care Assistance Eligibility increased income eligibility to 400 percent Federal Poverty Level and waived copayments, making child care free for most New Mexico families.
- New Mexico Child Care Finder Last month, ECECD released a groundbreaking child care search tool to help families find programs that meet their needs.

## **Access and Local System Building**

- \$10 million for Child Care Supply Building Grants
  Projected to create 1,000+ new child care capacity
  where it is needed most.
- \$157 million in stabilizations grants distributed to 1,000+ child care providers across New Mexico
- Local Early Childhood Coalition Building Grants
   Investing in 15 early childhood coalitions representing
   12 counties to improve state/local coordination, local
   capacity, and family engagement





## **ECECD FY24 Budget Priorities**

- Expand access to quality services and supports
- Increase transparency, efficiency, and effectiveness
- Enhance public and private partnerships
- Strengthen local-to-state communications and decision-making

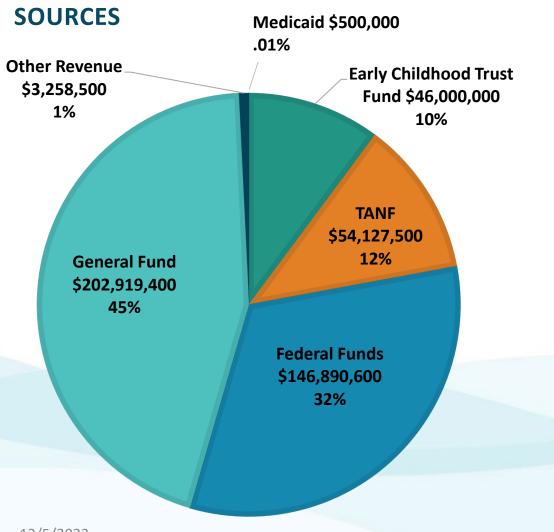

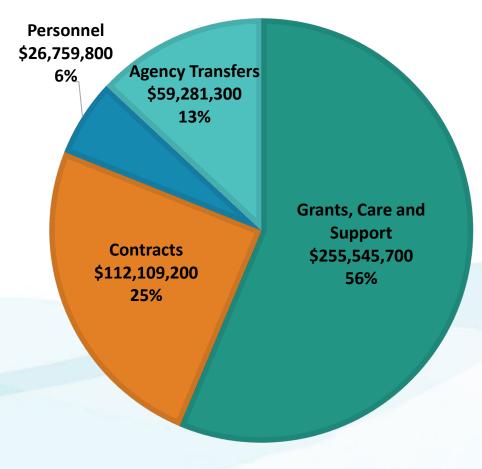

# Four-Year Finance Plan: Background

- Required statutorily by SB22, the 2019 bill that created ECECD
- Developed in partnership with national experts at Prenatal to Five (PN-5) Fiscal Strategies
- Creates a funding framework to create a world class PN-5 system of programs and services for families and young children



## Four-Year Finance Plan: Key Findings

- Funding for PN-5 early childhood services is too often linked to available funding, not actual cost of services, resulting in low wages and compensation
- Quality supports are not resourced at the level truly needed for the type of trauma-responsive, relationshipbased work these services present
- Partners at all levels can support investments in the PN-5 system, including local communities, sovereign nations, the federal government, business, and philanthropy



## Four-Year Finance Plan: Near Term Outcomes

- Build a high quality, accessible and affordable child care system that meets the needs of families
- Support our FIT provider network by paying what it costs to provide high-quality services to infants and toddlers with development delays and disabilities
- Expand evidence-based home visiting models to address the diverse and unique needs of families
- Expand high quality New Mexico PreK to more children
- Foster and enhance public/private partnerships that strengthen communities and improve outcomes for families and young children

## Four-Year Finance Plan: Long Term Outcomes

- Improved access to high-quality programs and services, with more choices, for all families
- Increased number of well-compensated and credentialed early childhood professionals
- Enhanced educational and health outcomes
- Widespread economic and societal benefits
