



Community Schools help students learn

Apex for Education 2009 evaluation:

- ✓ Pajarito Elementary School increased math scores by 23% and reading scores by 13% in 2 years.

Emerson ES decreased student mobility rate by 15% in 1st yr.




CEPR-UNM 2012-2014 report of 10 Community Schools:

- ✓ ELL unexcused absences decreased over 18%
- ✓ 2 or more discipline incidents decreased over 15%
- ✓ 20% increase in math & reading for economically disadvantaged students

Community Schools are smart schools

The 3 major “value-adds” of a community school:

- garner additional resources to reduce the demand on school staff for addressing all the challenges that students bring to school
- provide learning opportunities that develop cognitive, social, emotional, physical and civic competencies
- build social capital-the networks and relationships that support learning and create opportunities for young people while strengthening their communities



- ✓ Coordination
- ✓ Family Engagement & Supports
- ✓ School-based or linked health
- ✓ Extended Learning
- ✓ Evaluation



2015 ESEA – Every Student Succeeds Act

- ✓ Broader indicators beyond academics
- ✓ Supportive programs including Full Service Community Schools
- ✓ A new set of tools and resources to strengthen results-focused school-community partnerships for young people's success



2016 Coalition for Community Schools National Forum

- ✓ April 6-8 in Albuquerque, NM
- ✓ April 7th New Mexico State Network breakfast

The need to expand into other schools and more school districts is huge....and the time is **NOW**

Partnership

- \$Appropriate \$5M to PED for FY17 and FY18 for the Community Schools Act. to broaden **IMPACT** across approx. 60-70 schools in New Mexico.
- Create Task Force of other funding agencies to develop RFP for schools & districts encouraging them to partner
- Assistance from already thriving ABC Community School Partnership to help other local governments/school districts develop a “Community Wide Leadership” model.
