


The average college credit hours for dual credit students at the time of high school graduation are 32 credits







The percentage of minority students participating in dual credit is the same or greater than our regular students










Compares dual credit, San Juan College High School dual credit and regular college students within the same course-section

Based on a study of 200,000 high school students:

Across the board, former dual enrollment students are going to college at higher rates, 88% of students in dual enrollment programs went to college, and significant percentages earned a degree within five years — 46% of the students who enrolled in community colleges and 64% of those who enrolled in four-year colleges.


