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Financial Institutions Division (FID)



FID is requesting a budget increase for additional staff to meet statutory compliance of licensing and examinations. The results of being understaffed can be catastrophic to New Mexicans who depend on safe and sound financial institutions.

- 2014 FID's oversight has grown from 8,700 to 21,000 and assets at state supervised depositories have grown 77%.
- Current employee ratio is 1:636
- Federal compliance requirements continue to increase for all FID licensees, requiring more specialized examination staff.

- FID needs to add monitor small loan

Impact

• FID has lost its bank regulatory accreditation with the Conference of State Bank Supervisors, due mainly to understaffing. supervision staff to company lenders in the wake to HB132 and examination staff with specialized compliance and I.T./cybersecurity expertise.

Consumer Protection

Effective depository and non-depository supervision programs are critical to ensure that consumers are protected in the event of defalcation or failure. Without proper oversight and enhanced monitoring, New Mexicans are at a greater risk for fraud and loss.

Construction Industries Division (CID)

Cannabis Control Division (CCD)

CCD created in 2021 with the signing of the Cannabis Regulation Act, which legalized adult-use and commercial sales of cannabis in New Mexico and tasked the division with licensing and regulating the industry to safeguard public health and safety.

Cannabis Regulation Act

• The start of commercial sales in New Mexico was one of the most successful of any state in the country in terms of sales, totaling \$2.7 million the first day and nearly \$40 million the first month and has been consistent every month since.

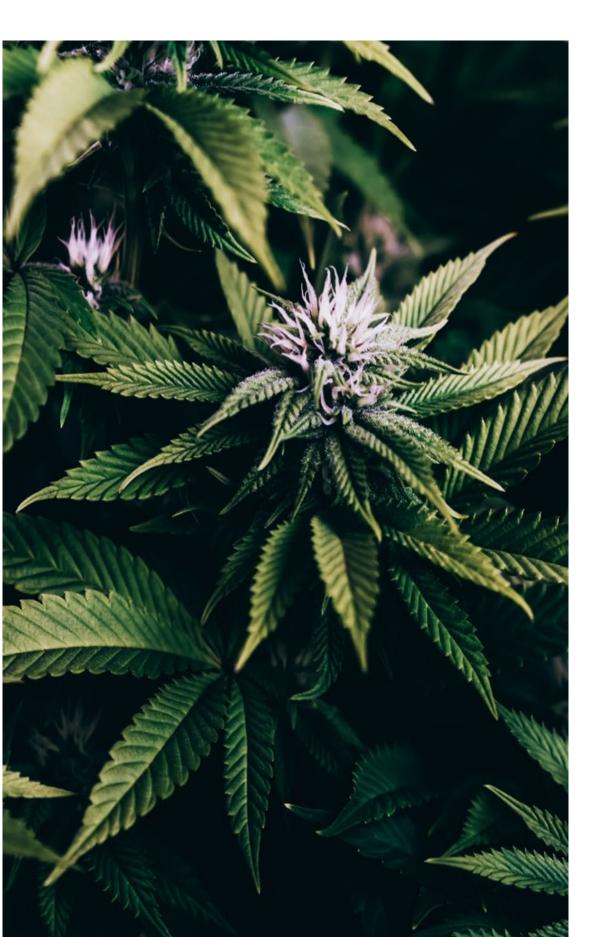

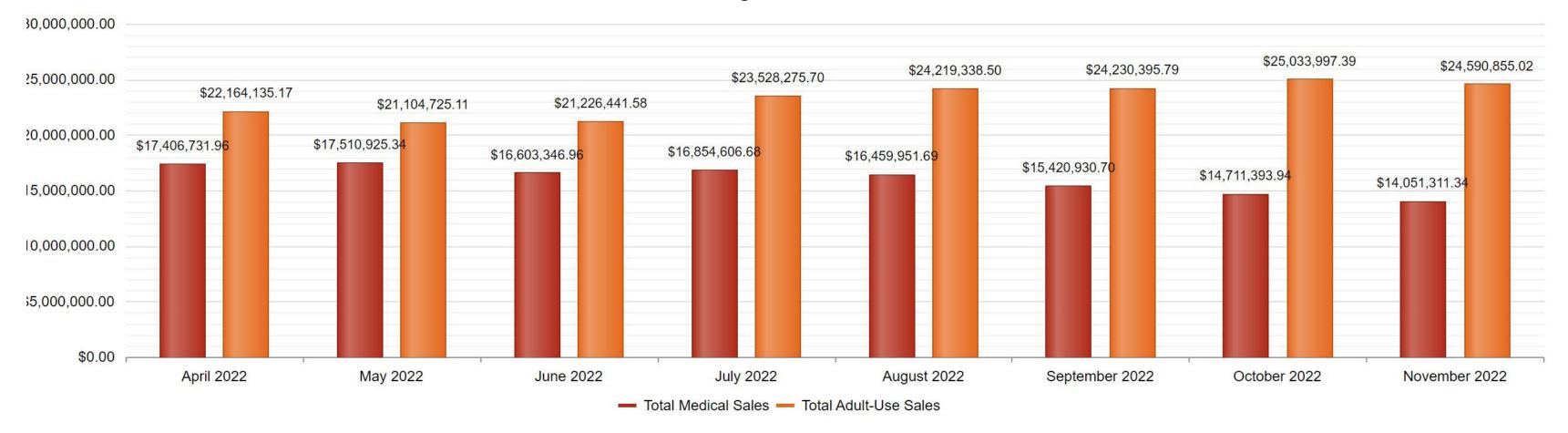

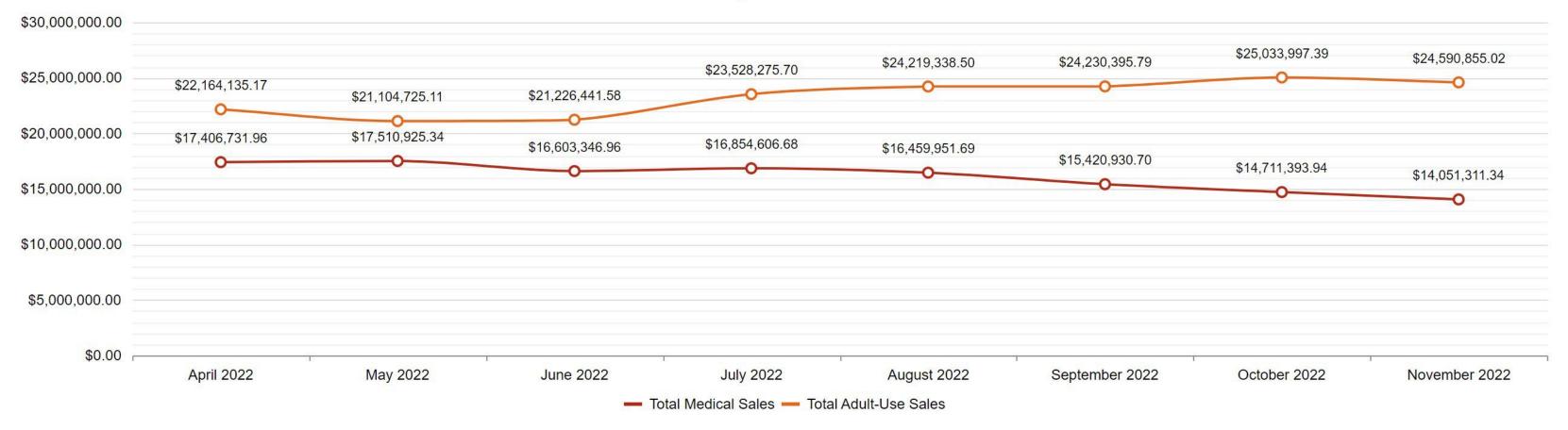

MHD continues to work with CID to create, identify and implement efficiencies for electrical inspections to remove the need for inspections by both MHD and CID. The MHD Director and Superintendent traveled to Washington D.C. and met with HUD, the Manufactured Housing Institute and Congressional

Growth

Federal and State law requires manufactured home installers to successfully complete 12 hours of training specific to the industry. To address the shortage of manufactured housing installers, MHD has partnered with the Manufactured Housing Education Institute to provide a New Mexico specific installer certification course and examination.

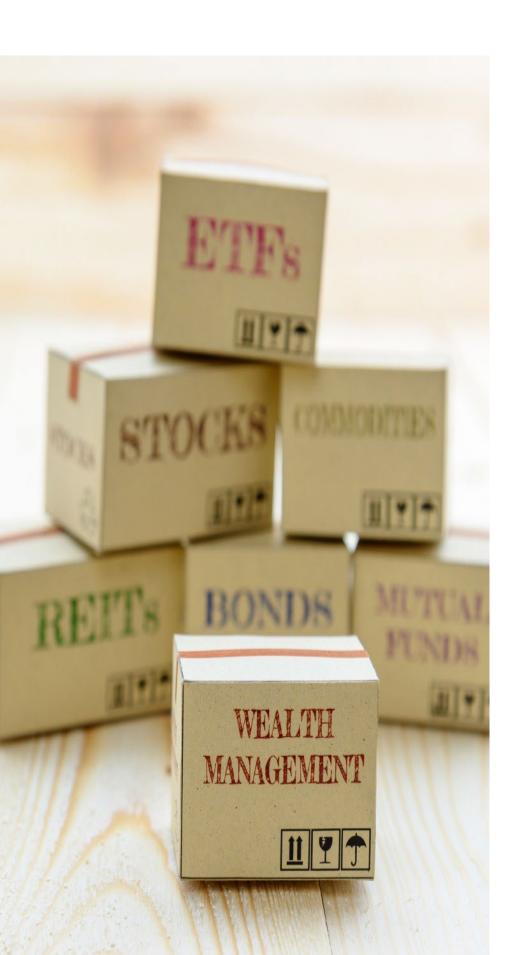

Securities Division

Securities is requesting budget increase ("special") in order to facilitate adequate staff and resources for licensing of the securities industry, regulation of securities sales, investigation and prosecution of securities fraud and the education of New Mexico investors.

Licensing & Filings

The Securities Division oversees licensing industry of the participants; the regulation of offers and sales of securities; the investigation and prosecution of fraud and market misconduct; and education of consumers, the investors and businesses seeking to invest or to raise capital within the state.

During FY 22, the Securities Division administered 202,436 filings related to the licensing of investment advisers, broker-dealers and securities products, collecting a total of \$23,920,22924 for the state.

Due to the sudden advent, rise and decline of novel forms of investments, including digital assets, meme stocks and special purpose acquisition companies, the Securities Division has closely collaborated with other jurisdictions to investigate and institute enforcement actions concerning unlawful conduct and consider relevant forms of regulation.

One multi-state collaborative garnered a \$943,396.22 settlement for New Mexico.

Compliance

Education & Enforcement

The Securities Division has been compelled to shift some of its education and enforcement focus to the increased risks stemming from the rapid rise of new and increasingly complex investments, including crypto currency and interest-bearing crypto accounts as well as an upsurge in social isolation.

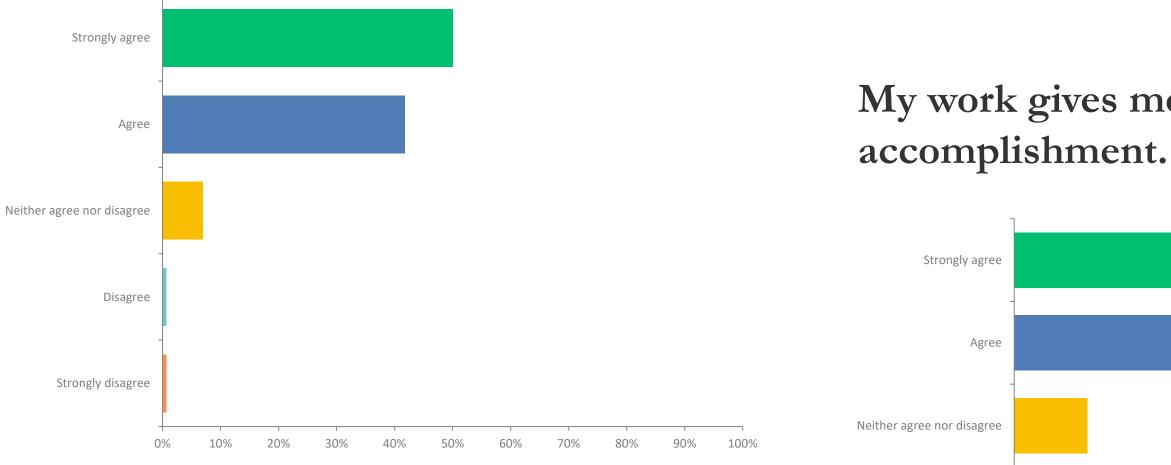

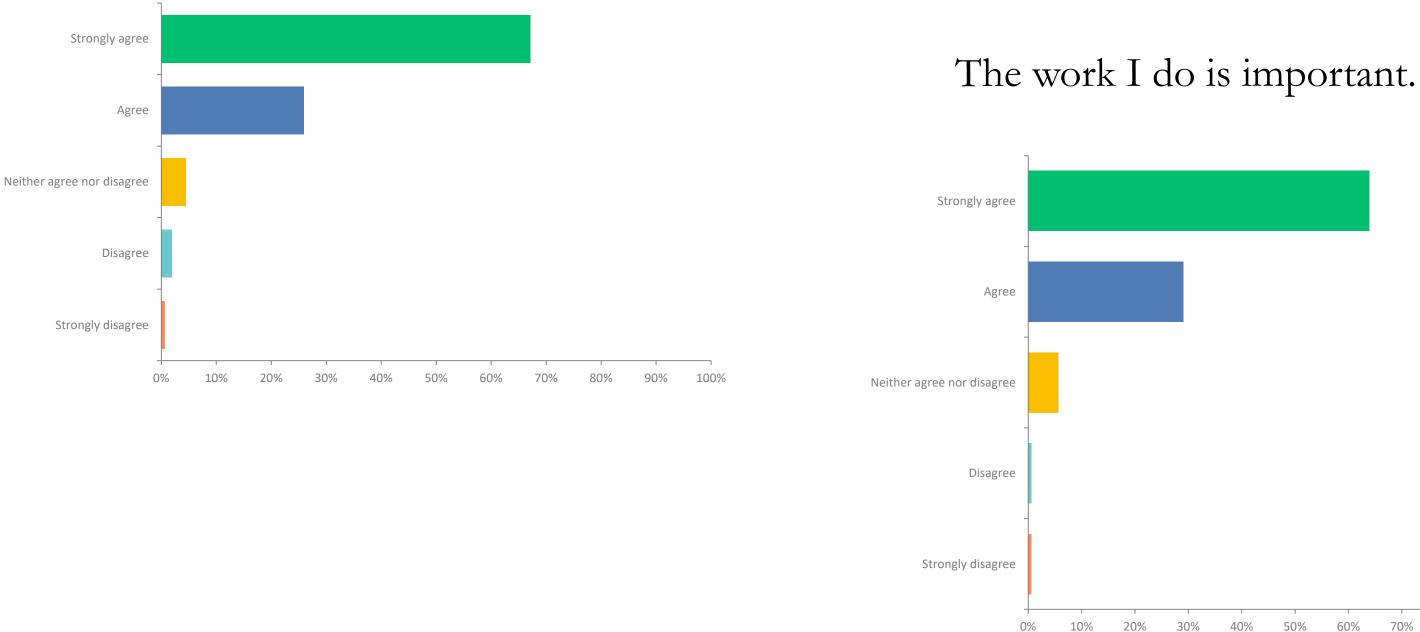
