# Preliminary Research Findings on Risk Factors for Juvenile Incarceration in NM

Youth committed to a secure facility are different from youth in the general population.

Seventy seven percent of committed adolescents have a mental health diagnosis.


About 65% of the youth committed to a facility were involved with *gangs* and 13% had family gang involvement.

### Risk Factors

- About half of the youth committed to a facility have a history of:
- One or more recent deaths of a close friend or family member 56%
- Parents with drug/alcohol problems 59% Youth have drug/alcohol problems 56%
- History of Parental Incarceration 47%
- Protective Services involvement 51% (31% Substantiated)



### Substance Abuse

- New structure for treatment
- 76% report using marijuana daily
- 29% use alcohol daily
- 24% use alcohol 1-2 times per week
- 60% have a mental health diagnosis
- 95% of our youth report developmental trauma of some kind

About one third of the NM youth committed to a facility have a history of:

- Physical Abuse 38%
- · Victim of Bullying 38%
- Bullying Aggressor 28%
- Raised by Grandparents 36%
- Witness to Domestic Violence 28%
- History of Self-Injury 28%



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## Protective Service Involvement

- All youth in facilities have a higher percentage of involvement with PS than the general population of youth.
- 51% of committed youth have a PS record (general population 4.6%), and 31% (general population 1%) with a substantiated allegation.



### Other Significant Risk Factors

- · A family member or friend committed suicide 25%
- Youth suicide attempts 23% (Last year NM had 20 more adolescent suicides than the previous year)
- · Traumatic head injury 27%
- Victim of sexual abuse 22%
- · Witness to death 22%
- · Witness to murder 19%



Additional services that are needed for our youth and how we are accommodating for that



### **Enhanced Programming**

- Native American MOU for treatment and culture specific programming
- Cambiar and Phoenix
- · Increased Staff Training on Mental Illness
- AA and NA
- · Substance Abuse Community Reintegration Protocol
- GED testing 32 Graduates
- · One therapist per 12 youths
- · Special Education and Vocational Training
- · Increased family involvement
- Proposed Equine Program



### **Transitional Services**

- · Both inside and outside of facilities
- Transition Services begin within the first 30 days of a committed youths arrival
- · Transitional Services can be provided up to age 21, although a youth may no longer be involved with juvenile justice services Contact: Robert Gerlock, 505-841-6650
