RE: School Based Health Center Services in schools rated C, D or F

The Teen Pregnancy Prevention Work Group of Dona Ana County is an advocacy organization that has a commitment to support all the comprehensive health services given at the School Based Health Centers. We presently have Department of Health sponsored SBHCs at Gadsden, Chaparral, Onate and Las Cruces High Schools.

This is to represent a support letter for proposed funding to the DOH for supporting behavioral health services to schools rated by PED as C,D or F schools. The four high schools mentioned are either C or D rated schools.

We agree with the basic tenet that many children who have mental health issues represent those who will have learning difficulties unless their problems are ameliorated through professional care. Since we have a high poverty rate in the mentioned schools we all know that stresses from living in under these conditions can create undue pressures on families that create burdens on children that spill over to their academic lives. Today, teachers are concentrating on attempting to raise academic achievement levels and may not have the necessary time to address mental health issues that children display in the classrooms. Teachers must have someone to turn to that has the expertise in assisting children through crises or a residue of problems springing from their home environments. The care for these problems sometimes must be immediate and within easy reach for the child. Our experiences with School Based Health Centers has shown that children respond well to services located within the school environment. When mental health issues are confronted the confidentality of dealing with the problems within the school will greatly assist the students as opposed to being sent to someone outside the school.

We have attached a summary sheet of the visits made to the four SBHCs in the Dona Ana County high schools for 2011-2012. The totals show that there were 2,995 vists made to the centers. Of this number, 1,535 or roughly one half of the total were classified as behavioral health reasons. Employees in the centers will describe cases of depression, anxiety and even suicidal ideation found amongst those coming to the centers. With this type of distribution of visits it becomes quite apparent that we need to fund these centers at a higher level than we are at the present time to provide more resources for this level of care.

Therefore, our organization highly supports legislation that will increase the DOH funding to make more mental health services available for our SBHCs.
