The Role of Manufactured Home Communities (MHCs) in Affordable Housing

Key Information	 New Mexico lacks around 32,000 affordable housing units. Manufactured homes provide a significant source of affordable housing in New Mexico, especially for low-income and senior households
Challenges Facing MHC Residents	 With the increase in out-of-state and private equity buyouts, many MHC residents find themselves unable to keep up with skyrocketing rents, poor maintenance, and absent management. There is no public enforcement of NM housing laws and dwindling options for residents who need legal help. Manufactured homes can often not structurally withstand a move. Even if they can, the cost to move a manufactured home is often cost prohibitive.
The Result	 To keep up with ever increasing rents, residents must cut back on other necessities like food and prescriptions to avoid eviction. When residents are evicted, they often have no choice but to abandon their largest asset - their home. Predatory corporations buy the abandoned homes for pennies on the dollar.

Preserving Manufactured Home Communities Through Resident Ownership

- ROCs allow residents to collectively purchase and manage their manufactured home community.
 - ROCs provide stability, prevent displacement, and offer residents control over community decisions and rent.
- With ROCs, rents are used to preserve and improve existing communities. The money stays local rather than going to out of state corporations.

Legislative Options for Preserving MHCs



Amend the New Mexico Mobile Home Park Act to grant residents the opportunity to purchase their park int the event of a sale.



Establish a system of public enforcement for existing housing laws.



Increase civil legal service funding to ensure that residents facing legal issues in their park have access to meaningful legal help.

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
